KarenL: Another "laboratory" resource is MCREL. http://www.mcrel.org

BJB2: both sources have been around for a long time

KarenL: Another resource I recently discovered is Just4kids. It is a "scientificallybased" resource on best practices for student achievement.

BJB2: cool, Karen

DavidW: what does "scientifically-based" mean to you, Karen?

KarenL: http://www.just4kids.org/en/washington/best_practices/framework.cfm

KarenL: oops, I mean scientifically researched-based, according to NCLB.

KarenL: I will tell you this is an excellent resource for best practices. Have some "real school" examples, instead of just theory.
