BJB2: you have to invest in overcoming adversity

JohnathanC: What were the y fighting for...Liberty and for who.....Us!

JohnathanC: They didn't give up, so what is your excuse Johnny

JeffC: hmmm... do you bring in the black panthers into your discussion?

JohnathanC: Parallels to situation in Iraq?

DavidW: much greater motivation fighting for one's homeland

JohnathanC: guerrilla fighters holding off the greatest land and naval power in the world

JohnathanC: How do you defeat an opponent fighting for a cause?

DanaO: passion, when you put your all into a cause

JohnathanC: yes

JohnathanC: speaking of violence and war, lets move on to another song

JeffC: I'm not joking about my question btw. the black panthers rose out of the disproportionate number of blacks being sent to Vietnam... classism... racism... etc. lead to anomie... and of course a need for revolution. there are certainly parallels to the

revolutionary war to be brought out there.

JohnathanC: I haven't brought them in previously but I do see your point....hard to know when class clowns are being serious

JeffC: well... when we use words like "anomie"

JeffC: oh yeah... that too

JohnathanC: thanks Jeff be sure to scroll below the text on my page and explore some of

the links

JeffC: let me ask... in all seriousness... about bringing up extremely relevant horrific cases of student violence, world violence, etc.... do you fear repercussions from parents/admin, etc. who might argue that you're inciting possible action by students?

JeffC: because... in my experience... admin would rather *ignore* horrors than face them...

JeffC: if they're not discussed... they're not responsible.

JohnathanC: Its all about the context... we use the songs to try to understand why these things happen, not promote them

StellaB: This might not work in a rural or conservative community, like mine, where only like 12% of residents have college degrees

JohnathanC: bullying, mental illness, violence in the home

DanaO: but if a cool band like "Pearl Jam" is singing about suicide, I could see how kids could want to emulate that behavior without realizing Pearl Jam's original intent

JeffC: I'm not arguing that you're promoting them... but as Stella says... just *mentioning and discussion* of issues like these often raise red flags.

JohnathanC: student visual...

DanaO: it's going on whether we talk about them or not. The kids just feel adults are out of touch if we don't talk about them
