**BJB2**: are you familiar with fanfiction, Lauren?

**BJB2** . o O ( it was kind of new to me )

**LaurenWB**: not really, but I am an English teacher and think it would be interesting to incorporate into the curriculum

**LaurenWB**: gives students a chance to be creative, challenges them to think about what they read previously

BJB2 nods

**BJB2**: did you take a look at the two links Patricia has featured in this room?

**LaurenWB**: I'm definitely interested in anything that makes them think

**LaurenWB**: not really

**LaurenWB**: I just thought a discussion would be interesting

**BJB2**: <a href="http://www.fanfiction.net/">http://www.fanfiction.net/</a>

**BJB2**: hold down the ctrl key when you click on the url

LaurenWB: wow

**BJB2**: gives you quite a few examples of what is being done out there

**LaurenWB**: there's a lot

LaurenWB: !!

**LaurenWB**: I first heard about fanfic because I'm into Harry Potter and saw recommendations for good fanfic on the website

**BJB2** smiles

**LaurenWB**: and it was really enlightening to see what young writers are doing

**BJB2** nods...we do lose sight sometimes of what people in other parts of the country are doing and become kind of locked into our classrooms

**BJB2** . o O ( which is why Tapped In is such a great resource for educators )

LaurenWB: it is

**LaurenWB**: I attended an assessment chat last week

**LaurenWB**: got some great ideas

**BJB2**: the other site that Patricia has featured is <a href="http://www.livejournal.com/">http://www.livejournal.com/</a>

**LaurenWB**: oh yeah

**LaurenWB**: blogs are big for this stuff

**BJB2**: Patricia was interested in learning how other educators are using technology with fanfiction

**BJB2**: during last month's discussion we did talk about blogs and wikis

**BJB2**: how else could you engage your students to write for an authentic audience?

**LaurenWB**: well my school system is working with SchoolFusion, which is apparently like a high school version of Blackboard...that might be a forum to share their work that could also work it into the classroom

**LaurenWB**: a system like that

**BJB2**: hmmm, interesting. Were you aware that TI has a K-12 Student campus?

**LaurenWB**: yeah, but I'm not sure if my county would approve it's use without looking into it first

**LaurenWB**: they're big on that stuff where I am

**BJB2**: you could also bring your students to the TI student campus and collaborate with another classroom in your district or in another city or state

**BJB2** understands about admin concerns

**LaurenWB**: but I'll definitely let them know that it's available

**BJB2**: I will let you know that the student campus is a safe and secure place. The teacher

creates the classroom and assigns usernames and passwords

**BJB2**: when the students log in they land in that classroom

**LaurenWB**: I know that they've created a major initiative about cyberbullying

**BJB2**: they are not able to enter any other classroom or room in the student campus unless you designate that feature

**LaurenWB**: so I'm sure that would alleviate some concern

**BJB2**: when the students log out if they have engaged in real time text chat their transcripts are emailed to the teacher

**BJB2**: this gives the students a safe place to LEARN TO BE ACCOUNTABLE FOR ONLINE BEHAVIOR

**LaurenWB**: lol that's definitely needed

**LaurenWB**: it's a free-for-all for them right now

**BJB2**: we filter up the wazoo and try to protect kids from everything...but it's not a very realistic process...

**BJB2**: we have an obligation to teach them to be good netizens

**LaurenWB**: at least someone is

**BJB2** . o O ( unless we want to keep them under our wing forever ;-) )

**LaurenWB**: I just want to create a place kids can feel safe with sharing their fanfic...a lot of students are really shy about it (I would know--I teach creative writing)

**BJB2** nods...the student campus classroom has a threaded discussion board where students could post their writing

**BJB2**: you can assign real names to each student or give them numbers

**BJB2** . o O ( whatever gives that that sense of security )

**LaurenWB**: I really want to try to apply this to normal English classes too...give them a chance to really have to think about they've read when they adapt their own version

**LaurenWB**: I'd probably assign numbers myself if it wasn't creative writing

**LaurenWB**: I expect the creative writing students to share;)

**BJB2**: would you use a specific book or topic for all the students in a class, Lauren?

**BJB2** . o O ( for fanfiction )

**BJB2**: I'm very interested in the creative process also...and see very little of it with my students

**BJB2**: have you read Daniel Pink's A Whole New Mind?

**LaurenWB**: I'd use what we read in class: short stories like "Contents of the Dead Man's Pocket", "Lamb to the Slaughter", "The Cold Equations", "The Pedestrian" or books like "To Kill a Mockingbird", "Night", etc

**BJB2** nods. So the students could write the story from a different character's point of view for example?

**LaurenWB**: the reason you don't see much creativity is that NCLB no longer requires them to be creative, unfortunately...I could easily see someone asking "how does FanFic fit into our curriculum?"

LaurenWB: yeah, I'd have them experiment with pov, tone

**Laure nWB**: mostly POV at first...that would be the easiest for the non-writers

**BJB2**: I really recommend Dan's book...a great case for teaching and nurturing creativity

**LaurenWB**: also they could write new endings, sequels, prequels

**BJB2**: have you used picture books?

**CaryH** joined the room.

**BJB2**: Hi, Cary

CaryH: Hi!

LaurenWB: no picture books yet...I'm just trying to find a way to work this in

**BJB2** . o O ( The True Story of the Three Little Pigs for example )

BJB2: we're discussing creative writing, Cary...and how it can be used with fanfiction

**BJB2**: are you a fan of fanfiction, Cary?

**LaurenWB**: that would be a great way to introduce it

**BJB2** nods to Lauren...non threatening

**CaryH**: This is my first time in an online course on Tapped in.

**BJB2**: welcome to the community, Cary. Are you a teacher?

**CaryH**: Yes, although I am currently working at the district level as an instructional technology specialist.

LaurenWB: cool

**CaryH**: So, dumb question but is this whole session a chat room?

**LaurenWB**: pretty much

**BJB2**: what's your district's attitude on creativity, Cary? Arts, literature, etc.

**BJB2**: Tapped In is a community of practice for educators, Cary...

**BJB2**: there is a monthly calendar of public discussions...

**CaryH**: I think we're fairly status quo...typical traditional education.

**CaryH**: Okay, so what exactly is fanfiction?

**BJB2**: but there are also over 800 special interest groups, a student campus, and many university profs bring their classes online here

**LaurenWB**: FanFiction is fiction is a branch of fiction loosely based off of something previously written by another author

BJB2: some schools also do prof dev for their teachers in Tapped in

**CaryH**: I've visited several times but have not really taken the time to thoroughly investigate all the possibilities of Tapped In.

**LaurenWB**: from a different point of view, different time setting, etc

**BJB2**: sort of like unraveling a story and knitting it back together in a new format

**CaryH**: Okay, hence the reference to "The True Story of the Three Little Pigs".

**BJB2**: right.

**BJB2**: I've found that picture books often help to make the topic less threatening to the

students

**CaryH**: I know some of the teachers at my former school did some of this type of writing. The kids really enjoyed it.

**LaurenWB**: FanFic is big in popular literature...Harry Potter has a huge following in FanFic, and I've discovered many of our creative writers write FanFic as opposed to their own stories

CaryH: Interesting.

**LaurenWB**: I'm on the fence if it's the best way for them to learn to creatively write, but it's something

**LaurenWB**: at least they're thinking

**BJB2**: I think I'm on the same fence as you, Lauren!

**CaryH**: I think it's probably a great way to teach story.

**BJB2**: it's the next step before plagiarism

**CaryH**: Yeah, well what an authentic way to introduce plagiarism!

**BJB2** laughs...yikes!

LaurenWB: yeah

**BJB2**: but you're right in that the basics of the story are already there so it takes off some of the pressure

**LaurenWB**: that's a concern...teaching the line between homage and stealing

**BJB2**: at least with fanfiction you are aware of the original story

LaurenWB: exactly

**BJB2** . o O ( you as the teacher )

LaurenWB: which is why I'm interested

**LaurenWB**: they HAVE to think about the story before they can change it

BJB2 nods.

CaryH: It's a natural hook, though...kids (particularly middle school students) are drawn

to crossing the line.

**BJB2**: do you have your students work from an outline?

**LaurenWB**: I probably would

**BJB2** . o O ( or a graphic organizer of some kind? )

**CaryH**: So, do you use tools such as Inspiration or Gliffy?

**BJB2** smiles...that was my next question, Cary!

**BJB2**: you could use those tools

**CaryH**: Are there other ones out there?

**BJB2**: probably ;-)

**LaurenWB**: I like Inspiration myself

**BJB2**: I can't keep up with all the online tools available

**CaryH**: Inspiration has not caught on in my district...probably due to lack of professional development.

**BJB2**: so Inspiration would be a good tech tool to organize a fanfiction story?

**CaryH**: I think so, although I'm new to fanfiction talk. :0)

**LaurenWB**: I like how you can potentially use it to break up the parts of the story with it, and then have space for them to make their potential changes

**LaurenWB**: keeps them organized so they don't fall into plagiarism by accident

**CaryH**: It is a great way to pull in those visual learners.

**BJB2**: Cary, the owner of this group has posted two URLs that you should look at ...they're featured in this room above the chat window

CaryH: Yeah, I saw them...will check them out!

**LaurenWB**: and you can also make outline versions of the same thing for those students who are a bit more linear

**BJB2**: good comment, Lauren...along with creativity, we need to teach academic integrity

**BJB2**: another way to use an outline is to convert the outline to a ppt

**BJB2**: it's like using file cards for each topic

**BJB2** . o O ( I'm not sure they even make file cards any more! )

LaurenWB: yeah

**LaurenWB**: I also would probably use student peer editing in the actual classroom...work on editing skills as well as plagiarism identification

BJB2: nice

**CaryH**: I have to go now...sorry...but it was nice chatting with you!

**BJB2** waves bye to Cary. We're almost finished

**CaryH** left the room (signed off).

**LaurenWB**: I think I'm going to try this next semester

**LaurenWB**: just to see what happens

**BJB2** sighs...guess Patricia isn't going to make it. I apologize, Lauren, but I enjoyed the discussion

**BJB2**: perhaps you can join a future discussion and let us know about how it works

LaurenWB: thanks!
