GailH: I started making a seating chart for this group!

JenniferLH: What a cool site.

**ShariB**: I'll be sharing this one at school

JenniferLH: me too

**LeanneMM** smiles at Gail...always a keener in every group!

GeorginaN: or the oceans!

**SusanR**: These generators guide you through the process of creating a variety of assessment and evaluation tools. You could use them as criteria checklists, discussion checklists, 3 point - 5 point rating scale, matrix rubric, weighted matrix rubric, and matrix rubric with points.

**MindyAS**: I think the assessment tools are great. I also like the seating chart:)

**JoannaPT**: I also like the letter generator, what a time saver

**JenniferLH**: What a great way to do field trip letters!

SusanR: I filed it in the K to 3 resource room as well so I can access them from school

**BrendaE**: I liked the Substitute Helper Generator

**MindyAS**: I found the bookmark generator. The kids would love that!

**SusanR**: There may be some overlap from other sessions

SusanR: next

**GailH**: I like the Classroom Rules generator -- great to set aside for use (before that long!)

**SusanR**: The next one has a whole host of tools for both students and teachers that lend themselves to collaboration. My personal favourite of course is yours truly, TrackStar whereby one can view thousands of online lessons or quickly create your own. **ButhainaA**: oh, cool, thanks Susan

**JoannaPT**: that could be very helpful to me

**LeanneMM**: very warm...I'm enjoying an iced cappuccino at the moment

**JenniferLH**: I think the assign-a-day calendar tool would be something parents would like to access.

GailH: The project based learning part has stuff in Spanish too.

**SusanR**: I use Trackstar for all my presentations..I like the choice of having a TEXT VIEW or FRAMES VIEW

CarolF: Oh can I use Casa Notes!

BrendaE: What's the difference between text view and frames view?

SusanR: let me give you an example

**GailH** . o O ( Susan's virtual handouts on Trackstar mean that she "presents" in places she doesn't even know about when people like me use those handouts as resources for another event. )

DianneA grins at Gail

**SusanR**: This is text view..I am using it now

**JoannaPT**: grasps more attention

**BrendaE**: Thank you.

**GailH**: I feel vindicated! Even Susan is using her own handouts as a link (at sites that sizzle). I never thought of this layering thing.

SusanR: I have tried other virtual handouts; but I keep coming back to Trackstar

**SusanR**: like this one..social bookmarking

**SusanR**: Social Bookmarking as a Teacher/Student Collaboration Tool

**SusanR**: Are you aware of social bookmarking

LeanneMM: no

JoannaPT: no clue, please explain...

BrendaE: No

JenniferLH: I've never heard of it.

**EmilyW** is very aware

CarolF: no

**SusanR** . o O ( an upcoming session )

**SusanR**: Social bookmarking is an activity performed over a computer network that allows users to save and categorize (see folksonomy) a personal collection of bookmarks and share them with others. Social bookmarking is a wide ranging topic but one that is well worth your time learning about. The whole idea of social bookmarking is to share bookmarks with everyone else. However, I still think there are some bookmarks you really want to keep only for yourself. similar social bookmarking site.

JoannaPT: that's neat

**SusanR**: Play with it on a rainy day and you will see the possibilities here. ie if a group of kindergarten teachers wanted to share links

**DianneA**: Jeff offers great social-technical-teaching bookmarking, too

**LeanneMM** sees how that would be very collaborative

**BrendaE**: This has great possibilities.

**SusanR**: http://del.icio.us/doc/about

EmilyW: there are different social bookmarking sites

EmilyW: I use del.icio.us

**JenniferLH**: It would be a good way to find more good sites.

**EmilyW**: it is a great way

**BrendaE**: I haven't used it, but heard a little about del.icio.us at NECC

**GailH**: The process of finding and documenting them is good for the people doing it too. Practices being critical observers, etc.

**SusanR**: Here is an example called delirious

MindyAS: I've never heard of it before, it sounds interesting

**LeanneMM** agrees with Gail

SusanSi: I need to do this

EmilyW: it looks like Sue lost her connection

DianneA: While we wait for Susan to come back

**GailH**: For those of you who like Sue's style as much as I, you'll enjoy browsing ALL of her collection at Trackstar.

**DianneA**: OK Gail, back to your more important suggestion

SusanR: Thanks Gail

**DianneA** nods to Susan

**SusanR**: Are you aware of Brainboost?

**ButhainaA**: My students like BrainPop, although they are university Ss..it has many interesting movies that help them learn in a fun way

JenniferLH: I've never heard of either Brain site.

**DianneA** butts out and lets the session flow again

**SusanR**: a question and answer search engine that I use frequently

**MindyAS**: I've seen some of the brainpop movies before

SusanR: and see students using it as well

**BrendaE**: Is backflip better than ikeepbookmarks? I work with grades k-6 and staff.

**ButhainaA**: What's Brainboost, Susan?

**ShoshanaH**: that link is really cool I never heard of a way to share bookmarks, I am forever emailing links back and forth to people and this is really helpful

**SusanR**: Brainboost is an answer engine whereas Google is a Search engine. <a href="http://www.brainboost.com/">http://www.brainboost.com/</a>

SusanR: Brainpop and Brainboost

ButhainaA: I haven't used ikeepbookmarks, so I can't tell, Brenda

ButhainaA: I see, is it something like, AskJeeves, Susan?

**SusanR**: Brainboost is a question answering engine that accepts natural language queries and uses natural language processing techniques by actually answering questions, in plain English and in complete sentences. Try it! Please give me your impressions both as a student and teacher resource! It even suggests related questions to the topic.

**JoannaPT**: so when kids ask questions you don't have an answer for, go to that site =)

**GailH**: I asked it what a trapezoid looks like. Very good!

**JoannaPT**: I think aj.com works too

SusanR: What was the response, Gail

**MindyAS**: I tried asking what animals live in the rainforest, and it brought up a lot of good sites I didn't find when using a search engine!

SusanR: Answers in complete sentences

**JenniferLH**: I asked how many colors were in the rainbow and got the answer and awesome lesson plan sites and more.

**CarolF**: I like the quick definitions and the related sites

ButhainaA: wow, interesting, thanks, Susan

**JoannaPT**: yes, thanks

**JoannaPT**: these are all very cool sites

GeorginaN: fantastic for students...clear

**JenniferLH**: It is amazing how many great sites there are - its overwhelming sometimes.

SusanR: Is it a viable site

**GailH** . o O ( I asked it who is newest member of Supreme Court! )

SusanR: and Gail the answer....

**MindyAS**: Wow, I wish I knew about this sooner, it would have saved me some headaches on search engines!

**BridgetM**: Now that I figured it out I like the little pop up box.

GailH: It gave for the Canadian supreme court ....

SusanR: It did, Gail

**BridgetM** smiles

GailH: Morris Fish

**SusanR**: I wanted to deal with two cool hardware tools and their related sites.... before the end of the hour

**ButhainaA** listening to Susan

SusanR: a great gadget ...the iPod Shuffle

GeorginaN: great Susan

**LeanneMM** knows nothing about iPods

SusanR: I suggest public schools make better use of talking books using the iPod

**MindyAS**: That would be wonderful

**SusanR**: Why not have public schools increase literacy by using talking books.

**CandaceP**: There is so much information being given that I'm very thankful I will receive this dialog later to reread everything. I looked at the gdouza.com link and really saw some outstanding lessons I could really use without changing anything. And I have tried trackstar before and that is outstanding, too!!! There is soo much sharing... this is awesome!!!

MindyAS: How do schools get the iPods?

**CarolF**: What are the advantages over the tape recorder?

**SusanR**: Perhaps the iPod Shuffle can motivate educators to experiment with them.

**BridgetM**: one presenter at neec said they were switching to ipods for talking books

**SusanR**: Why not consider purchasing about 10 iPod Shuffles and load them up with talking books. Allow them to sign them out. Consider collaborating with your district's Technology Integrator and put forth a proposal in the form of a grant. Can you consider other uses for the iPod Shuffle in the classroom?

**JenniferLH**: Is this very expensive?

GailH: It makes a lot of sense.

SusanR: Right Bridget

**MindyAS**: Can you explain what they are?

**ShoshanaH**: I have heard of great things being done these days concerning learning via ipods, though some people absorb information better by looking at the words in front of them...

SusanR: I will let Apple explain

SusanR: http://www.apple.com/ipodshuffle/

**JoannaPT**: teachers also get 20% off on apple.com and in the apple store

**JenniferLH**: I think kids would really like this.

MindyAS: Kids would love it

**MindyAS**: Where can you find a list of talking books?

**JenniferLH**: I don't know if our administrators would go for it though.

SusanR: There has been considerable talk about podcasting here at the festival

**BrendaE**: Mindy, good question.

**ShoshanaH**: I know if ipods had been around when I was in elementary school I would have been glued to it!!

**GailH**: There is the PTA and other support, besides the school itself.

**JenniferLH**: Gail, good idea - our PTO is very supportive when sometimes the administrators aren't.

SusanR: Parent councils can offer support

**ButhainaA**: Try < <u>www.audible.com</u>> for lists of free books

BrendaE: Thank you

**SusanR**: a set of 10 iPods to rotate to different classrooms

**CarolF**: Okay guys. You all seem familiar with these. What do I tell my principal when he asks me why they are better than the listening center w/ tape recorder?

**GailH**: There is real value in making a case (writing something, having a plan, etc.) for something you need. And asking people who can't give to you to suggest who would want to support it.

**BridgetM**: us site <a href="http://www.rfbd.org/">http://www.rfbd.org/</a> Reading For Blind & Dyslexic

**MindyAS**: It seems like it would be an endless library of audio tracks since you can put on whatever you can find.

SusanR: I am going to try to put in a proposal for our school this fall

LeanneMM: Excellent Buth! Thanks for sharing!

**ShoshanaH**: I would think the same reason tivo is more popular than VCRs

**SusanR**: May I mention another great gadget with educational value?

SusanR: The SanDisk Photo Album

**ShariB**: please do

**Buthaina**A: Carol, I'd say it is more flexible in the sense that students can download a lesson for example and here using their MP3 band or ipods. Also, they are motivating since they are the trendy thing for kids now

**SusanR**: This gadget lets you show digital photos or show video on your TV directly from your digital memory chip or card. Ease of use means with this gadget you do not need to hook a camera or other device to your TV. This makes it easily accessible to the classroom teacher. Can anyone suggest other educational uses for this sensational gadget?

**BrendaE**: Not familiar with that. More info, please.
