LynneW: Welcome to our E-Portfolio Discussion group

LynneW: What kind of information are you looking for or want to talk about today?

PaulI: Pretty much everything. From basics to advanced.

PaulI: Thanks for the tip

LynneW: Sure

PaulI: Okay. Thanks

LynneW: Let's do self-introductions.

LynneW: My name is Lynne Wolters and I am the facilitator for this group.

Lynne W: I am an ed tech educator from Vancouver, WA

BJB2: I'm a retired art and communication teacher located in Pennsylvania

BJB2. o O (I'm also one of the Tapped In helpdesk volunteers)

PaulI: My name is Paul Iracheta and I am currently a science researcher from San Antonio, Texas.

PaulI: BS in Biology and Master's in Biology

PaulI: Currently working on second Master's degree

LynneW: Paul, will you explain your current interest/information need for e-portfolios?

PaulI: I'm pretty much new to e-portfolios, so any information that you can share about

e-portfolio's would be great

RobinO joined the room.

PaulI: Hi, Robin

LynneW: Welcome Robin

RobinO: hi

LynneW: Please introduce yourself.

RobinO: what is the discussion about?

LynneW: Electronic Portfolios

RobinO: I'm currently getting my Masters in Information Literacy at CSUSM

RobinO: I am a full time teacher in CUSD

LynneW: It would be helpful for me to know what your interest/need is for electronic portfolios.

LynneW: I am the group facilitator and an ed tech educator from Vancouver, WA

RobinO: I am in EDST 630; Technology in the Classroom

LynneW: Yes

RobinO: I think I can use electronic portfolios for my Master's program, but I am also interested in possible use with my students

LynneW: Robin, what is your desired grade level/content area for teaching?

LynneW: Paul is biology.

RobinO: Social Science/ grade 9-11

LynneW: Great.

RobinO: I'm also the AVID Coordinator

LynneW: Oh - you are busy!

LynneW: Good for you.

LynneW: Paul are you familiar with AVID?

PaulI: No.

TimothyWS joined the room.

LynneW: Robin will give a quick explanation?

RobinO: Since my AVID students will be going to college, perhaps this is a tool that will help them?!

LynneW: Welcome Timothy

PaulI: Welcome, Tim

LynneW: My name is Lynne Wolters and I am the group facilitator.

NicoleRC joined the room.

LynneW: Hi Nicole

RobinO: AVID is a class for underrepresented students in the middle...

TimothyWS : Hi

RaziaG joined the room.

NicoleRC: Hi

RobinO: they want to go to college, but have obstacles that may stop them...

LynneW: Welcome Razia

RaziaG: Hi

PaulI: Hi, Nicole and Razia

RaziaG: Hi to every one

RobinO: money, lack of support at home, etc

PaulI: I see

LynneW: Since we have so many new participants, let's begin again.

LynneW: Welcome to each of you.

RobinO: we put them in AVID as freshmen and keep them all 4 years

NicoleRC: I am also an AVID Teacher with Robin and Tim Sampson

RobinO: Hi everyone!

TimothyWS: it's ok we all teach AVID at Dana Hills

TimothyWS: Tim, Robin and Nikki

LynneW: My name is Lynne Wolters. I am the group facilitator and an ed tech educator from Vancouver, WA

RobinO: nod

TimothyWS: nod

LynneW: Please introduce yourselves, including where you are from, what you teach, what you are learning, and your interest in e-portfolios.

NicoleRC: nod

LynneW: Just chime in.

TimothyWS: Tim Sampson AVID Coordinator, English teacher, yearbook adviser.

RaziaG: I am a graduate student. I do not teach yet. I am from New York

TimothyWS: I'm from Dana Point CA

RobinO: Cali

PaulI: My name is Paul Iracheta. I am a science researcher from San Antonio, Texas. I have a BS degree in Biology and a Master's degree in Biology. I'm currently working on my second Master's degree in Education.

NicoleRC: I am Nicole Clements-Slocum. I am a world history and economics teacher at Dana Hills High School in Dana Point, CA, We are learning tech portfolios in our Master's program

LynneW: Since I never know who will show up for these sessions, I always bring in a new resource and link and then simply begin the discussion based upon what folks are most interested in discussing.

LynneW: Please pose your top most question about e-portfolios.

RobinO: how can they be used beside sharing work and ideas at the university?

LynneW: Any level is welcome. We can start with "what is an e-portfolio?"

TimothyWS: I actually know nothing about them and would like to know how I can use them in my classroom

PaulI: That sounds good, Lynne

LynneW: Let me start with what they are NOT.

NicoleRC: Can a school loop "class" discussion, count as an Eportfolio class?

LynneW: They are not a scrapbook or collector of anything and everything.

RobinO: nod

LynneW: Nicole I don't understand your question. Can you ask it again using different language?

NicoleRC: Robin....help answer

RobinO: No, Nicole

RobinO: You can not

RobinO: Nicole & I are discussing this on the phone now

RobinO: she gets it!

TimothyWS: sorry they are back on board

LynneW: They are meant to be a dynamic, visual, audio, reflective, creative representation of what a student has learned, challenges faced, obstacles overcome, what has been learned.

RobinO: nod

TimothyWS: nod

LynneW: They are considered a means of "authentic assessment".

LynneW: Is this a term you all understand?

TimothyWS: no

PaulI: I'm currently looking over the information on E-portfolio's on your page, Lynne. Good information.

LynneW: Thank you Paul.

LynneW: We all must assess what a student has learned.

LynneW: Facts, skills, thinking, problem-solving, communicating.

TimothyWS: nod. How can I view your page Lynne

LynneW: E-Portfolios are another means of a student demonstrating, an audience viewing, and educators evaluating artifacts of the learning process.

LynneW: Timothy - let me get through this baseline stuff and then we'll look at resources.

TimothyWS: ok

LynneW: Would that be okay?

LynneW: Great

NicoleRC: ok

RobinO: okay

LynneW: Any questions come to mind at this point?

TimothyWS: no

NicoleRC: no

RobinO: no

PaulI: No

LynneW: As a teacher assigning, supporting, and/or evaluating e-portfolios you must be very committed to strong pre-planning.

RobinO: I'm good there!

NicoleRC: how so

LynneW: First (and this is a biggy) who owns the portfolio?

LynneW: Any idea why I make this a top priority?

NicoleRC: taskstream

TimothyWS: because you have to pay a membership?

RobinO: Does the portfolio have to be hosted or owned by an institution?

LynneW: I must have derailed our train.

LynneW: I was going at this from a different sense.

LynneW: I mean creative ownership.

TimothyWS: oh

RobinO: Ohhhh!

NicoleRC: we are linear

LynneW: Who is the audience and who owns the learning.

LynneW smiles

TimothyWS: the class

RobinO: The audience is me and the class owns it???

RobinO: vice versa??

LynneW: Many districts are using digital portfolios to meet requirements for data collection.

RobinO: okay

TimothyWS: ok

NicoleRC: like data director?

LynneW: Students don't own their portfolios - the districts do.

RobinO: okay

TimothyWS: check

LynneW: What is required in them is vested by the district and not the individual students.

LynneW: It becomes a check off requirement for graduation.

PaulI: Okay

TimothyWS: got it

LynneW: Students must own their work.

TimothyWS: question

RobinO: I love it!

LynneW: Yes Timothy.

TimothyWS: what about kids that don't have access to computers?

TimothyWS: computer labs fill up quickly

NicoleRC: I agree

LynneW: Class time must be given.

RobinO: So, my AVID students would create a portfolio like they do now of all 4 years of school, except it would be electronic

LynneW: However, there will still need to be extensive time outside class.

RobinO: Does the student provide the site to the College for viewing?

LynneW: Some teachers have worked with their principals to create evening hours open to students for their e-portfolio projects.

LynneW: Others have created after school clubs with access to activity buses to return home later in the day.

PaulI: Good info, Lynne.

LynneW: Robin - I'm moving to your question now.

LynneW: The next big consideration is AUDIENCE.

LynneW: As with any quality written work, audience is extremely important.

LynneW: As is a beginning, middle, and end.

LynneW: However, with these digital projects, we must provide non-linear navigation throughout.

LynneW: Luckily, that part isn't difficult at all.

LynneW: May I describe my "ideal world setting"?

RobinO: please

TimothyWS: sure

NicoleRC: please

LynneW: Students would have already become familiar with their own learning styles.

LynneW: These learning styles would dominate the particular type of media format for their content.

PaulI: Okay.

LynneW: An artist type will be strongly visual and images will play a big part of the portfolio.

LynneW: A cerebral, writer type will have narrative with audio interludes explaining personal reflection.

RobinO: okay

NicoleRC: Like that Steven Hawkins?

LynneW: A student who is process oriented (science perhaps) will want a format that reflects a process or hierarchical order.

LynneW: So, when you plan the requirements - I would advise against being over prescriptive.

PaulI: Good info

RobinO: nice

LynneW: Give them the requirements and then help them see how their brains naturally wrap around processing and explaining data and experiences.

TimothyWS: question

RobinO: WOW!

LynneW: When words come with difficulty - ask them to take a digital image or create a poem, or song, or dance, or rap.

LynneW: If words are still necessary - this will give them a strong platform for coming to the words.

RobinO: How does this help them later... work or college admission, etc...

LynneW: Depends on the expected audience for a portfolio.

NicoleRC: Oh

TimothyWS: question?

LynneW: Yes

LynneW: I can add more to that last comment.

SusanR joined the room.

LynneW: Hi Sue.

RobinO: So, my AVID students would use it for college where other students may use it as a reflection of high school work?

LynneW: Welcome.

LynneW: Yes and

SusanR: greetings

TimothyWS: what happen when you are trying to achieve a specific data and the kids are not meeting

LynneW: it could be a pre-employment tool.

TimothyWS: the goals

LynneW: I believe the problem lies with my planning and communicating to the students.

TimothyWS: ok

LynneW: Make lots of easy to understand documents of your expectations and requirements.

NicoleRC: nod

RobinO: nod

LynneW: A rubric is a great tool.

LynneW: Then, they will know there is a continuum and they will fall somewhere within it.

RaziaG: nod

RobinO: do you have an example of a rubric for this?

LynneW: Yes Robin. There are lots of resources in this room and you can find them here.

TimothyWS: rad

PaulI: Thanks

RobinO: thank you :-)

LynneW: Then, students must be coached on what an appropriate artifact is.

RobinO: the word "artifact" confuses me in this context

JeffC joined the room.

LynneW: They must be trained to evaluate their own work to determine what is a best choice for their portfolios.

LynneW: Hi Jeff

JeffC waves

RobinO: artifacts to me are bones, cultural findings, etc

LynneW: Artifacts can be images, audio files, digital files, Word documents, spreadsheets, presentations.

TimothyWS: anything that people can access in your portfolio?

RobinO: Things I have done, or anything that shows what I trying to get across

NicoleRC: And they can be found in "Tapped In"?

LynneW: I think this is enough information to begin exploring with our remaining time.

TimothyWS: ok

LynneW: Look at the Room web page here.

PaulI: Okay

NicoleRC: ok

LynneW: You will see a text box labeled FEATERED ITEMS

RobinO: okay

LynneW: There are links to resources there.

RobinO: thank you for your time and knowledge

LynneW: Also, to the far left are links to room resources. They are located under LINKS

LynneW: I'll stay for 20 minutes to answer questions. Enjoy trolling for resources.

TimothyWS: thank you!

RobinO: thanks!! :-)

NicoleRC: cool

LynneW: Thank you for coming today.

PaulI: Thanks

RaziaG: hi , do we hear each other or we are just typing

RobinO: will this transcript be e-mailed to me by Tapped In or should I go back & take notes?

RaziaG: Sorry, I am new at this

LynneW: No problem. Yes, the transcript will automatically be emailed to you.

LynneW: Just typing.

RobinO: thanks so much!

RaziaG: ok

RaziaG: thanks

LynneW: You are most welcome.

RaziaG: can I ask a question on other topics now?

LynneW: Yes Razia

RaziaG: I am going to be a teacher. I want to know, how can I use Tapped-In sessions to create Virtual Field Trip for my students?

RaziaG: or may be I am in wrong session

LynneW: That is a fun way to use Tapped In.

LynneW: Jeff are you still lurking?

LynneW: I just posted a link to a YouTube video about eportfolios that BJ shared before she had to leave for a meeting.

LynneW: You might want to take a look at it.

LynneW: If you reload your page you will find it under FEATURED ITEMS or you can simply click on LINKS

PaulI: Thanks

RaziaG: thanks

RaziaG: please Jeff tell me what to do when you are ready

LynneW: I am doing another session Web 2.0 Tools for Schools at 5 PM

JeffC: well... if you want to leave this session we can do it now... but there's another half hour here.

LynneW: Jeff - this session runs from 3:30 to 4:30

RaziaG: ok

LynneW: We are finished.

JeffC: oops... ok... now is good then!

SusanR: Have you heard of bPortfoios, Lynne?

LynneW: No - what are they?

JeffC: when I leave here type /join JeffC (right here in chat, starting with the slash).

RaziaG: thank you so much Lynne
