SusanR: called Instant Poetry Writer

RussmeaA: this one is great too.. this is a nice way to intro into poetry before making them write their own!

SusanR: increases their confidence

SusanR: can be used as a warmup

SusanR: try it out this week with your class

LindaJM: I like the lesson plan ideas

SusanR: This next one is called PicLits .. inspired picture writing

SusanR: It's a free drag and drop literacy tool to create great sentences inspired by beautiful pictures.

SusanR: Move your words anywhere on the screen for creative writing.

SusanR: you can also click "freestyle" instead to type in your own words instead of choosing from their list.

SusanR: Word lists change, depending on the image selected. Piclits can be saved.

SusanR: Just a short blurb here

SusanR: <u>http://www.piclits.com/compose_dragdrop.aspx</u>

CybilR: Sp. Ed students would love it.

SusanR: a really neat creative writing site that provides pictures and a word bank

SusanR: good for reluctant writers

LindaJM: THAT IS COOL

RussmeaA: Definitely!

LindaJM: that is a good site for beginning writers

SusanR: give you a minute or two

DoloresG: PicLits just hit a glitch for me

CybilR: 1 like the short captions stated

SusanR: take some time with it later

SusanR: This next one caught my eye ..

SusanR: called Listen a Minute

SusanR: comes with quizzes and handouts

SusanR: would have to be teacher directed

CybilR: I like the suggestions of strategies before/during and after reading. I would use this as well.

SusanR: Can you each find a part of the Reading Rockets site you would use in your planning with students

CybilR: I like reader's theater. The students can have a reading script at their level of reading.

DoloresG: If I used something like this, I would do a podcast. The actual practice would need to be done in the regular classroom

SusanR: Readers Theatre can be used with English Language Learners

LindaJM: I would do something with technology too.. like digital literacy

RussmeaA: the site has a section on struggling readers. I have about7 kids who are reading way below grade level.. also I think the choral reading would help all my students to try and read with emotion and inflection, which is sort of a problem right now

DoloresG: I will pass these links on to my classroom teachers and maybe together we can work out some things

CybilR: I often use repeated reading, it works.

SusanR: You may find Word Ahead useful
