LynetteCS: Slidell, LA (but still consider myself to be from Tennessee) Elementary technology

DavidWe: I'm David Weksler. I'm in New Jersey and Bj and Jeff and I have been using Tapped In for more than 7 years. I used to work with the Math Forum - www.mathforum.org

GailH: I am Gail Hoskins, senior outreach coordinator for Eisenhower National Clearinghouse http://www.enc.org. We have been around for 13 years, funded by the US Department of Education. That funding will end 9/29/05. ENC is located in Columbus, OH. I am a former high school math teacher and K-12 math coordinator -- and I am currently looking for a job!

DavidWe: Who is that, at SDSU, Dawn?

DawnBat: Roberto DelBusto

DavidWe nods

DavidWe: Thanks

DavidWe: Lynette?

DavidWe: While Lynette is typing or thinking, I wanted to mention a little bit about the Math Forum MathTools web site that Bj mentioned

TillieC joined the room.

LynetteCS: I am taking an on-line course that has us exploring this site. As I stated earlier I used to teach math and now teach technology so this looked like the session for me to attend,

DavidWe: There was a very interesting discussion at 1pm EDT today with some people, in Tapped In, about the MathTools - a very large collection of largely online resources for teaching specific concepts - they are mostly JAVA applets

DavidWe: Thanks, Lynette. I appreciate your mentioning that

LynetteCS: I believe

SusanR: technology to what grade levels, Lynette

DavidWe: There is a group of teachers trying to use the MathTools (there are thousands of small, specific applets that have been developed)

EmilyW: wow, never seen this part of the math forum before

DavidWe smiles

LynetteCS: I believe Tilly that just walked in and then left is also in my class. I teach K - 5.

DavidWe: We'll see if Bj can guide Tillie back in here

SusanR: I subscribe to the math tools newsletter..most worthwhile

DavidWe thanks Lynette for mentioning it

GailH: Math Tools is funded as a NSDL project (national science digital library).

DawnBat: Those are found in the mathforum.org website?

DavidWe: In any event, there is an interest in both discussing the mathtools themselves (do they work, are they effective with students, etc.)...

SusanR: how to integrate these tools is the focus ...with concrete teacher tested ideas

DavidWe: www.mathforum.org/mathtools

DavidWe: Yes, Dawn

DavidWe: In addition, there is an interest in developing STORIES about using mathtools - an interesting idea in and of itself - as well as having teachers rate them, give them a grade

EmilyW: sounds very interesting

DavidWe nods

DavidWe: Yes. There was a small turnout this afternoon, but I was glad to be part of it

TillieC joined the room.

DavidWe: Applets exist for all grade levels for many different topics and hopefully they are organized in a sensible way, making it easy to find the "tool" you are looking for

GailH: Dawn, you are a middle school teacher, right?

DavidWe: Welcome, Tillie

DavidWe: Registering on the main MathTools page is worthwhile, you get a limited number of announcements

DawnBat: We are considered a middle school, but my students are in 5th grade. It's a pretty interesting set -up

GailH: May I give a specific url on math tools for that grade, please?

DavidWe: Do you know about the NSDL - National Science Digital Library?

DavidWe: Please do, Gail

TillieC: help, I'm trying to join the discussion in the after school online room. how do I do that?

GailH: http://mathforum.org/mathtools/cell/m5,ALL,tool,hh/ is what I'd suggest

DavidWe: You are in the right place, Tillie. Welcome

TillieC: oh Great

DawnBat: I am unaware of the NSDL

DavidWe: Want to quickly mention where you are, Tillie, and what you teach?

DavidWe: I'll get to that in a second, Dawn

DavidWe thanks Gail for the URL

SusanR: I used the fraction tools with a spec ed math class..to extend and enrich her program..she was delighted with the results

SusanR listens to Gail

GailH . o O (Those are ALL grade 5 math tools that have applets.)

DavidWe encourages Tillie to jump right in with a quick introduction

TillieC: I'm in Louisiana and teach 4th grade ELA and social studies

DavidWe: Again, welcome, Tillie. We're all glad that you could join us, this evening

DavidWe: Gail, do you have a good, brief description of NSDL?

TillieC: This is my first live chat, so please be patient with me. I'm new

DavidWe: You've got friends here, Tillie. Lots of guides on the side

TillieC: Great thanks a bunch

DavidWe nods

GailH: It is funded by NSF and has a lot of projects that are "separate" -- ENC has one for middle school math & science. There is an "umbrella" that they are all under.

DavidWe . o O (National Science Foundation == NSF)

DavidWe . o O (Eisenhower National Clearinghouse - www.enc.org == ENC)

DavidWe checks on whether everyone knows about ENC

GailH . o O (and I may be wrong in some of what I am saying.)

TillieC: I know you probably already covered this but what is NSDL? is it National Science for Distant Learning

DavidWe: There has been a tremendous amount of work developing, cataloguing, categorizing online resources in many subject areas

DavidWe . o O (National Science Digital Library)

DavidWe: www.nsdl.org

TillieC: WOW

DavidWe: The URLs (websites) are clickable in Tapped In - if you don't get a new window when you click on one of those addresses (and you are using Windows) hold down the Control key when you click

DawnBat: Thank you, that solves my problem

TillieC: I love science and math, but haven't taught it for 2 years now. Although I did National Certification in the area of middle childhood generalist and it required an entry in science and math. So I incorporated the environmental aspect into the social studies lessons

DavidWe: What I was most interested in sharing with you all, briefly, this evening, is my interest in the IDEA of having teachers tell/write/communicate stories about teaching - situations, methods, experiences, etc.

DavidWe: That's great, Tillie

EmilyW: I think it is a great idea

EmilyW: (especially for blog entries)

DavidWe: We on the science and math side of things have been working very hard to make more math and science integrateable into curricula K-20

SusanR: a reflective journal, David

DavidWe nods

SusanR . o O (a reflective math journal)

DavidWe: There was a wonderful book published early in my Internet education career by Wested called, "Tales from the Electronic Frontier" - a slim volume of teachers' stories about using the Internet in classrooms, almost 10 years ago

TillieC: this year I'm trying to incorporate a technology journal for all students. That will be difficult, but hopefully doable.

GailH: That was a classic -- and USED to be online too.

DavidWe: The challenge for math teachers in high school (especially in high school) is finding the VALUE in having students write about what they are learning, in addition to the content of the math courses

DavidWe nods to Gail

DavidWe: I tried to reach Mayumi Shinohara (the editor of "Tales") today, in fact...

SusanR: math journals were a required item. when I taught grade 2

GailH: Here is info ABOUT that wonderful book: http://www.enc.org/resources/records/full/0,1240,004277,00.shtm

DavidWe: The teachers participating in the MathTools discussion earlier today in Tapped In were mostly high school folks and this idea of reflective journals is tough to find time for

LynetteCS: If the book was published 10 years ago - is it outdated as far as technology usage?

DavidWe thanks Gail for another great ENC URL

GailH: The ideas are wonderful!

DavidWe: The technology may be somewhat outdated, Lynette...but...

GailH: but <see David's comment>

DavidWe: The way the teachers USE the technology is very fresh - it is what made it very valuable in the first place

TillieC: some of the technology is probably out dated, but many of the ideas may not be

DavidWe: The rationale for using the Internet needs to be compelling

TillieC: I'm sure they could be adapted to meet today's tech

LynetteCS: Gail, I've been exploring with the manipulatives on the MathTools url that you provided. These are great.

DavidWe: They are just good teaching "cases" - and hearing the teachers talk about how they dealt with problems (having only one computer, for example) makes you realize the value of hearing the stories

DavidWe is glad that people are finding the MathTools website useful

DavidWe wants to mention a couple of things about Tapped In to Tillie, Lynette and Dawn

DavidWe: Have you all found the Tapped In Calendar of Events, yet?

DawnBat: Yes

DavidWe hopes Jeff, Gail and Bj may chime in about specific events

TillieC: yes that is how I found about this chat

JeffC: sign up there Tillie... ok... I'll shut up

DavidWe taps the chalkboard with his 39 inch yardstick

TillieC: I'm going to try it

SusanR: http://www.blogger.com/start

DavidWe: Great, Tillie

TillieC: ok my mouth is shut

DavidWe wants Susan to stay after class

DavidWe . o O (spell doofus a googleplex times)

GailH wants to stay too then!

SusanR: okay..I am all ears

JeffC tosses spitballs at David behind his back...

DavidWe: Oh, man!
