Title of Session: Cyberethics, Cybersafety, and Cybersecurity

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Room: After School Online

BJB2: we'll start as soon as Davina, the discussion leader logs in

Joan W: Besides being the assistant director of PATH, I'm also the Vice President of WHOA-KTD - which is working to halt online abuse - kids and teens division.

JoanW: Jayne Hitchcock who founded WHOA is a professor.

BJB2: ahhh, great, Joan.

Joan W: She went through cyber hell, but after fighting back she founded WHOA back in 1997 to help others.

BJB2: while we wait for Davina, how about a couple tips...

BJB2: go to the Actions menu in the top right of the chat window and click on DETACH

Joan W: Well, #1 rule is if someone is bothering you, SAVE all documentation, but DO NOT contact that person back.

LizMK: I did that

JoanW: The more you engage with that person who is cyber-bothering you (bullying harassment, stalking, etc.) the more they know they are pushing your buttons.

LizMK: so now the screen's bigger

LizMK: nice

JoanW: Most of the WHOA-KTD internet safety advocates are either teachers or involved in law enforcement.

JoanW: WHOA-KTD believes in education, as well as giving advice.

JoanW: They're not out to make a media name for themselves like some groups.

BJB2: Joan, how about if we have everyone introduce themselves, please

BJB2: tell us where you are located and what you teach

BJB2: I'm an art teacher in Pennsylvania

LizMK: I'm Liz - in NJ - teach 8th grade French and Spanish - pursuing masters in ed tech - conducting research for a project

Joan W: I'm Joan - (disabled) YA Librarian

HelenK: I am in BC, Canada and I work with adult students

Joan W: Who LOVES helping people even though I can't in real life.

BJB2: it doesn't get much more real than this, Joan!

JoanW: I'm also helping a friend who is starting an after-school center in her town, and giving her and the founder suggestions

MaryMa joined the room.

BJB2: We've had discussions in Tapped In led by Nancy Willard who is big voice in cybersafety

JoanW: I know Nancy !!!!!!!!

JoanW: She's great !!!!!

BJB2: is anyone familiar with her information?

BJB2 smiles...yes, she is

JoanW: In fact a friend of mine has been helping her with her book!

LizMK: I'm unfamiliar

MaryMa: I'm new as of today

JoanW: In fact, I think I can credit Nancy with finding TI

JoanW: I think that's how I found you guys in the first place - one of her articles that had a transcript online.

MaryMa: question, if you don't mind

JoanW: sure

MaryMa: Are we waiting for Davina, the leader of this discussion?

BJB2: yes, Mary

LizMK: I was wondering the same

MaryMa: okay, thanks, this is my first time on this site

JoanW: ooops sorry BJ

MaryMa: where is everyone from?

BJB2: I appreciate your contribution to the discussion, Joan

LizMK: NJ

JoanW is on Long Island, NY

BJB2: Mary, we did intros a little earlier

MaryMa: I'm sorry

MaryMa: I'm from Chicago, an elementary teachers for Chicago's district

BJB2: glad you could join us, Mary

BJB2: Joan was telling us about some of the cybersafety issues she is involved with

BJB2: and I mentioned Nancy Willard who is active in cyber safety issues

JoanW: WHOA-KTD contacts the isps that folks have problems with and send them transcripts, etc., plus give advice to the folks that come to them.

LizMK: interesting

JoanW: They also have a list of attorneys and pi's if it gets beyond their scope.

JoanW: Whoa was started by a professor/author

LizMK: I don't know if this is at all what you deal with...

LizMK: but I had some students a few years back that found out my aol screenname

LizMK: and were im'ing me filthy, dirty sexual msgs

LizMK: it was terrible

JoanW: AOL is probably one of the toughest isps to fight, but they do have a legal department.

Joan W: Just SAVE all documentation, IM logs, emails, anything that is sent electronically.

JoanW: but do not respond to them.

LizMK: the way I handled it was print and ignore

LizMK: that's exactly what I did

JoanW: GOOD for you!!

LizMK: it was so inappropriate

LizMK: I felt a little bit helpless

JoanW: I am so sorry - this has been a very long day for me, but I hope to participate with this group in ensuing weeks.

JoanW: Take care, and good evening

JoanW left the room (signed off).

BJB2: tell us what you did, Liz...

BJB2: anything other than ignore?

LizMK: not too much

LizMK: it didn't get very elevated

BJB2: we are all vulnerable to this kind of thing...and we're adults...

LizMK: it was a few isolated times

BJB2: just think how the kids feel when it happens to them

LizMK: so I felt like ignoring was the best thing to do

LizMK: eventually it dwindled off

LizMK: I can imagine

LizMK: and I hear that it happens all the time, being a middle school teacher

LizMK: and of course then there's the whole myspace issue

BJB2: the site that Davina usually shares is

HelenK: there are features that will let you block out unwanted contacts but I usually use a more restricted access to control who can contact me

LizMK: that's what I did as well

LizMK: nowadays, with aim, kids can have like 10 different usernames

LizMK: so you block one and then another comes within a minute...

BJB2: is blocking the answer?

BJB2: or is it an educator's responsibility to teach safe use of online resources?

BJB2: during the last discussion Davina talked a little about MySpace...are you familiar with that?

LizMK: I am

BJB2: I've explored the site...

BJB2: they do have all kinds of rules and regs...

BJB2: but the bottom line is that the users have to be responsible for what they post

LizMK: right

LizMK: I've actually had a profile on myspace for years

LizMK: along with all of my friends

LizMK: WAY before any of my students started to become crazed

BJB2 grins...crazed is about it!

LizMK: my profile states nothing that I'm concerned about students viewing

LizMK: I know that they've seen it

LizMK: so it's very general - nothing to hide

LizMK: but I've seen some of my student's

LizMK: they're horrific

LizMK: if I were a parent, I'd be all over it

BJB2: ahhh...another important idea...

BJB2: are parents aware of what their kids are doing online?

LizMK: parental awareness?

BJB2: is it their responsibility to check?

LizMK: they certainly ought to be

LizMK: I believe so

BJB2: I agree, Liz

LizMK: what are your thoughts?

BJB2: Melissa? Helen? Mary?

MaryMa: yes

LizMK: there was one of those wife-swapping shows on a few weeks ago

MaryMa: I'm wondering how to check my teen daughter's activities on the nt

LizMK: and one of the families didn't realize what their teenage daughter (from NJ) was doing on it

LizMK: they were shocked to say the least

BJB2 nods to Liz.

LizMK: and then worked together with her to make her site appropriate

BJB2: Mary, have you asked your daughter?

BJB2 . o O (to show you the sites she goes on)

AndreaM joined the room.

MaryMa: no, but I see her using IM's

BJB2: you can also check the history of the sites she's visited

MaryMa: that's about it

BJB2: most of the kids use IM. Sometimes it's enough to let your kid know you are

interested

BJB2: Hi, Andrea

AndreaM: Hello

MaryMa: true, BJ

LizMK: and I'd suggest

LizMK: discussing the nature of myspace with your daughter

MaryMa: I am not familiar with myspace, is it free?

LizMK: if she knows that you know and are aware, she'll probably be more inclined to

act appropriately???

LizMK: yes it is

LizMK: it's been all over the news lately

MaryMa: I will ask her

LizMK: supposedly, the deaths of at least 2 teens may be traceable back to myspace

predators

BJB2: http://myspace.com/

LizMK: I think that'd also be a topic worthy of a heart-to-heart discussion

LizMK: it's really scary

MaryMa: I will definitely check it out

LizMK: not scary to me - a 33 year old, educated woman that knows how to make

decisions

LizMK: but, I fear for some of my 13 year old students that have profiles

BJB2 . o O (like not posting a photo of yourself in your underwear)

LizMK: exactly!

MaryMa: Liz, why do you go to my space, it sounds like a kids hangout?

LizMK: not really

LizMK: in my opinion

LizMK: that's the most recent

BJB2: it wasn't originally created for kids, Mary

MaryMa: I don't know, I will have to check it out

LizMK: it started as more of a 20's-30's networking site

LizMK: it wasn't until about a year ago that the kids started getting on it

MaryMa: rats, kids ruin everything!

LizMK: the idea itself isn't bad, it's a great way to keep in contact with friends and/or

colleagues

LizMK: they really do!

LizMK: it just needs to be used appropriately

LizMK: there was a similar site before myspace called friendster

LizMK: it never blew up like myspace did

LizMK: but I found some long-lost friends from my college days

BJB2: and kids need to see appropriate internet space modeled by parents and teachers

MaryMa: oh how fun

LizMK: true

LizMK: which is why I've decided not to remove my profile

LizMK: there's nothing wrong with communicating, sharing blogs and pics with your

friends

BJB2 agrees

LizMK: in my opinion

MaryMa: no, that's what's best about the net

LizMK: I had a parent tell me last year that the kids have seen my myspace profile

LizMK: and I just told her that I was aware of that and it was ok with me

LizMK: I actually have a message to the students on my site

MaryMa: I'm wondering, Liz, if your students act better knowing that you are on the site

LizMK: well... that would seem logical...

LizMK: however

LizMK: they've sent me friendly requests

LizMK: which I always deny

LizMK: but they bring me to their profiles

LizMK: where they curse

LizMK: and have half-naked pics of themselves

LizMK: that's actually the worst part

LizMK: that I try to avoid dealing with

MaryMa: girls or boys or both?

LizMK: I've gone to our sac/counselor about this

LizMK: both

BJB2: I apologize for the discussion leader not showing up.

MaryMa: np

LizMK: we've had a nice discussion though

BJB2: was there anything else that anyone wanted to discuss?

MaryMa: does anyone have ideas on how to prevents kids getting inappropriate pics from google or yahoo?

LizMK: hmmm

MaryMa: or is there a kid appropriate place to find pictures

BJB2: good question, Mary

LizMK: yahooligans?

BJB2: Let's make that the topic for next month's discussion

MaryMa: I'm there!

BJB2: and if you have resources to share on that, bring them to the meeting

BJB2: sound good?
