SMichaeGst8: Who is BJ and how will I know if he waves

CarolynFK: I'm a HS English teacher and Deaf ed. specialist. I'm taking an on-line course to get acquainted with what's on the net for teachers.

SMichaeGst8: I am a first grade teacher who happens to be taking a class teaching online technologies. My assignment was to visit chat rooms and experience their diversity. This seemed like a very interesting topic.

SusanR: I am a K to 8 Occasional Teacher (this week ESL and Special Ed) from Ontario, Canada..and how to better integrate the arts and literacy

BJ smiles happily...what a lovely group of participants!

BJ: to put Michael's curiosity to rest, to wave in Tapped In, type a colon and the action. :waves

SMichaeGst8 waves

BJ: has anyone had a chance to look at the PBS site art:21?

BJ cheers for Michael. Feel better?

SMichaeGst8: lol

SMichaeGst8: I was wondering what BJ waves meant

SMichaeGst8: my 14 year old son thinks I'm retarded

EricaKR: I snooped around a bit, not too much though

JaredL: not yet, sorry!

BJ: emoting is virtual body language...as important in Tapped In as real body language is in a f2f discussion

SusanR: not yet

BJ: np...I'm going to start us off with the main page. Click on the blue hyperlink to open the webpage

CarolynFK: art 21 showcases individual working artists, varying mediums, right? **BJ:** <u>http://www.pbs.org/art21/series/index.html</u>

BJ: right, Carolyn...that is part of what they have **BJ**: their primary audience is middle and high school, but I think a lot of the information could be adapted for primary grades **BJ:** did everyone get the site? JaredL: yes EricaKR: yes SMichaeGst8: yes CarolynFK: yes, but our words are covering part BJ: as you can see, art:21 focuses on contemporary US artists BJ: Carolyn, can you overlap the screens. I'll shut up while you take a few minutes to read SusanR nods **BJ:** btw, we're just going to do a pretty superficial overview of the site this month. Jessica Hamlin from art:21 will be my guest in June and will be giving a more in depth description **BJ:** everyone take a quick look at the page? SMichaeGst8: yes JaredL: yes **BJ:** the sitemap at http://www.pbs.org/art21/sitemap.html **BJ:** gives you a good idea of what is available EricaKR: done **BJ:** let's take a look at one of the lessons BJ: http://www.pbs.org/art21/education/abstraction/lesson3.html LaurenB joined the room. **BJ**: one of the features I really like is the link to the glossary BJ: Hi, Lauren. Welcome. We're looking at http://www.pbs.org/art21/education/abstraction/lesson3.html **BJ:** this is one of the lessons that could be adapted for all grade levels. SusanR agrees SMichaeGst8 nods BJ: art:21 collaborates with SchoolArts Magazine BJ: they featured the work of Kara Walker in the last issue **SusanR**: a very complete lesson plan..students can even submit their art work **BJ** nods BJ: any other comments or questions? **EricaKR**: is there any liability issues with posting student work? SMichaeGst8: The critical questions would make great journal entries BJ: good question, Erica. That's something I think you could ask Jessica next month **BJ**, o O (I'll forward this transcript to her so she'll know what to expect **JaredL**: I was thinking that would be a cool lesson to do along with students writing an autobio writing assignment EricaKR: okay I'll make a note too **BJ:** excellent suggestions Michael and Jared BJ: The education index is at http://www.pbs.org/art21/education/index.html SMichaeGst8: It also opens up especially for high school the concept of topical looks vs inner being. Which likeness is being portrayed and why

BJ: I like the way the lessons include clips from the series...a real multimedia presentation

SusanR: I am impressed with the reflection and going further components of the site. **BJ:** any comments, Carolyn?

BJ: Lauren, did you have any questions on arts:21?

CarolynFK: nope

BJ . o O (I told the group earlier that Jessica Hamlin from arts:21 will be my guest for Arts and Literacy in June and she can guide us through the site in more depth)

EricaKR: How long will things stay posted and will there be an archive to refer back to as years pass?

BJ: I think there already is an archive since this is year two.

LaurenB: Wow, I know one of those artists. Antin lives here in San Diego. It would be fun to take the kids to a museum to see her work.

BJ: But I don't know what the plans are for the future...another question for Jessica! **EricaKR**: many of these lessons would be fun to repeat over the years and this site is a great source

BJ: cool, Lauren.

BJ: real time field trips are always a wonderful opportunity

SMichaeGst8: There are probably wonderful budding artists in each of our city's that can be tapped into.

SMichaeGst8: There is art all around. It is so pervasive that we block it out.

BJ agrees with Michael

CarolynFK: It's good for students to see an actual working artist, whether via pbs or in real life--not just the finished products.

BJ: and discussing how the site can be used to encourage writing and reading for our students

SusanMcg joined the room.

BJ: one resource for working artists is often your local arts councils

LaurenB: Right Carolyn. And it's great to see an artist who is living!

BJ: hi, Susan. Welcome. We're looking at http://www.pbs.org/art21/series/index.html

SMichaeGst8: color, line, movement, and music are critical for humans. Many times ideas cannot be expressed in any other way because of their complexity and intensity. LaurenB: Most kids know the Ninja Turtle four...

LaurenB: Leonardo, Michaelangelo, Rafael, Donatello

SMichaeGst8: My first graders draw pictures to capture their ideas and then write the sentences.

BJ: excellent connections, Michael

CarolynFK: My HS kids turned Macbeth into a graphic novel.

LaurenB: I have my 11th graders draw in their reader response journals, and if they won't draw I'll have them collage or design things on the Internet

EricaKR: so much art with primary it's great to teach different types of art with them - we just finished pointillism

SMichaeGst8: The more we can help them understand how to access and manipulate the elements of art. The more conversant they will become in that medium and it will spill over to other forms of communication.

BJ: for the upper grades it's also important to understand the political and social messages the artist is communicating

CarolynFK: Yes, and play with the medium, not stay within some arbitrary lines/framework.

SMichaeGst8: The computer is great for art. It seems like this generation will do anything if it's on the computer.

BJ . o O (not just for contemporary artists, but also for historical works of art) **LaurenB**: Right, a study of art can spill over into a study of propaganda.

BJ: you all might be very interested in participating in ArtsConnected tomorrow **BJ** . o O (www.artsconnected.org)

BJ: you can create your own museum collection to support your lessons on communication

SMichaeGst8: Symbolism that is used in art has actually often been used for millenniums.

BJ: please mark your calendars for June 7 for Arts and Literacy and our guest Jessica Hamlin from arts:21

SMichaeGst8: How often do you do this?

EricaKR: is it at the same time?

BJ: and make a note of tomorrow's ArtsConnected discussion with Kevin Nitzberg **LaurenB**: Is this show something that you have to buy or are their episodes for free somewhere?

SusanR marks her calendar

BJ: yes, Arts and Literacy is the first Monday of the month, same time

SMichaeGst8 say neat

BJ: Lauren, I think you can use much of the site without purchasing any of the episodes **BJ**. o O (but you have that option if you wanted to purchase episodes)

LaurenB: I just may anyway. It is cool stuff.

BJ: Confronting Conflict is a timely lesson

LaurenB: I only ask because some of their shows are available completely online BJ: a lot of teachers don't have high speed connections...downloading a large video would be painful at best

EricaKR: that is an understatement!

LaurenB: <gasp> Every teacher should have a high speed connection... by law. for free!

SMichaeGst8: Thank you for a lovely experience. This was great. I will be back another time. Good-bye!

BJ: shoulda's and does are two different animals, Lauren

SMichaeGst8 left the room (signed off).

JaredL thanks Bj as well

BJ: you're welcome, Jared. It's been a pleasure

LaurenB: Darn it, I wish my alarm had gone off so I wouldn't have missed the first 20 minutes.

ChristinAA: Sorry I was late. Sounds like some interesting stuff on this site. I will be doing some heavy exploring on my own.

BJ: any comments or questions, Christine?
