RichardJH: (keiko back to you) KeikoS: yoroshiku onegai shimasuj.

KeikoS: Now intro everybody!

RushtonH: My name is Rushton Hurley, and I work with a set of public charter high schools in San Antonio, Texas (I was principal of our online school for a year and a half). I also have taught Japanese for thirteen years. I spent two semesters at Kansai Gaidai (Hirakata campus), back in the day. Enjoy 80s music and juggling. 8^)

RichardJH: I am now teaching English at Kansai Gaidai too!

RushtonH: Yoroshiku

KeikoS: Welcome Kazumi, we are doing just introduction.

AnnaGst10: Hi Anna From Brisbane Australia. High school teacher

RichardJH: hi Anna

RichardJH: < lived in Melbourne 4 years

ShuniI: I teach EFL in Tokyo. Virtual travel to USA project is all based on web pages at http://www.netlearne.com/ie04.htm. It incorporate email exchange and synchronous text chat at Tapped In.

AnnaGst10: Hi never been to Melbourne, planning to go next year for a conference

RichardJH: you'll love it! **RichardJH**: St Kilda is great

SteveInGst8: Steve cavrak, at university of Vermont, studying Japanese, teaching assistant w/ technology issues.

NinaGst9: I'm Nina Langton - here in Osaka as an exchange professor at Tachibana Women's U in Kyoto. Will return to my university in Kelowna, Canada, at the beginning of August to teach Japanese there

RichardJH: hi Steve

JkfTexaGst11: My name is John Fahey, I am Director of Liberal Arts Technology Center at UT EL Paso. I have MA in Linguistics. I am interested in Japanese language learning with technology.

RichardJH: Nina my friend Masashi Asai is at your Uni

MikiGst7: I am Miki Yokoyama, teaching at Future University-Hakodate and Hokkaido University of Education.

RichardJH: so you know him?

RichardJH: hey Miki!!!

MikiGst7: Hi!

AnnaGst10: Love the idea of public transport that works Richard. What's teaching like there??

RichardJH: o-hisa!

RichardJH: last met Miki in Hawaii last year

NinaGst9: Asai sensei's office is right next door to mine!

RichardJH: Nina his wife was my first teacher of Japanese!

RichardJH: Asai-san

NinaGst9: I'll say hi to him for you on Monday

RichardJH: yeah !! RichardJH: yoroshiku NinaGst9: kochira koso

AliceW: Hi, I'm Alice, also from Brisbane Australia **RichardJH**: hi Alice (i taught in Melbourne for 4 years)

AliceW: Great spot!

MaryGst5: .
RichardJH: yup

AnnaGst10: Alice will need to get your email etc I like to network.

ButhainaA joined the room.

KeikoS: Hi, Buthania, we are doing intro

RichardJH: my e-mail is on the paper for this session

RichardJH: all mails welcome!

ButhainaA: ok, thanks, I'm here now..

RichardJH: hi Buthaina

ButhainaA: Hello all. I'm Buthaina, an EFL instructor form Kuwait.

ButhainaA: Hi Richard.. **KeikoS**: Welcome!

ButhainaA: Thanks, Keiko

KeikoS: Today's presentation is based on the paper. **KeikoS**: I know Richard showed URL earlier... **KeikoS**: Everybody is familiar with the paper?

RushtonH: yes NinaGst9: yes

AliceW: Very interesting paper, thanks Richard!

ButhainaA: an excellent paper...I had printed out to go back to it whenever

RichardJH: my pleasure

AnnaGst10: yes JkfTexaGst11: yes MikiGst7: yes! RichardJH: ok?

ShuniI: Read it with interest. **AnnaGst10**: Interesting

RichardJH: Basically what I want to propose/discuss here is that...

ButhainaA: I like it since it is very much related to my recent learning experience at Webheads' CoP...

RichardJH: 1) I see it as our job as teachers to provide learners with meaningful learning experiences when learning Japanese

RichardJH: 2) the theoretical framework for doing this exists, one example of which is Social Constructivism

RichardJH: 3) Social Computing research and development now gives us the tools to implement these ideas

RichardJH: 4) Online Communities are one kind of tool for giving learners meaningful experiences, by which I mean using Japanese in (digitally virtually) settings in which it is used by the Japanese themselves. We can take learning out of the restricted (impoverished) classroom model of learning into richer domains

RichardJH: 5) As yet we don't really know what is happening when learners go into these communities, we need more research, based on naturalistic fieldwork (ethnomethodology) to find out what is going on...!

RichardJH: so

RichardJH: I think we are seeing a convergence of theory/practice happening

RichardJH: changing the learning environment in many ways

RichardJH: I listed some types of OC in my paper what do you think?

RichardJH: online communities **MikiGst7**: I really liked and agreed

RushtonH: I liked the variety. While I know this applies to anyone with an interest able to type, do you have particular kinds of students in mind (college students, for example)?

RichardJH: I think the range is now so broad as to include many age groups

MikiGst7: to the idea of Community first and online second.

RichardJH: and the interesting thing is cross age learning...

RichardJH: learning between mixed ages

SteveInGst8: the "community" I've been studying most this semester is the one centered at http://www.fotolog.net/tokyotoday

RichardJH: what kind of community is it? **RichardJH**: what is the shared goal? **SteveInGst8**: photo+blog+friendster **RichardJH**: making online friends?

SteveInGst8: some people make online friends; others link real friends online.

sometimes language and social convention make it hard to figure out

RichardJH: what is the common language?

SteveInGst8: Brazilian!

RichardJH: ok....

KazumiGst6 joined the room.

SteveInGst8: Seriously, 3/4 of people are from Brazil ... I think ...

RichardJH: ok

RichardJH: hi Kazumi

SteveInGst8: but the community is centered in Tokyo!

RichardJH: exactly!

RichardJH: this is the time we are living in!

KazumiGst6: at last am I in here after 30 minutes of trying to enter?

RichardJH: otsukaresama >kazumi **KazumiGst6**: sorry to have delayed you

RichardJH: np

NinaGst9: you mentioned in your conclusion about the challenges for students who are not yet capable of handling the environment because of lower level of skills - since I teach beginning students, this is a concern for me

RichardJH: yes Nina

RichardJH: I am using these OC with middle/advanced learners

RichardJH: what are your concerns?

NinaGst9: any suggestions for actual projects?! RushtonH: Nina, describe your students please. RichardJH: well...look at the WebQuests site!

NinaGst9: I have access to WebCT and can use the tools there, but haven't yet **RichardJH**: the issue is what sense can they make of the environment they are in

RichardJH: what meaning they construct **RichardJH**: what do you want them to make?

AnnaGst10: I like the projects and webquests but lack the technology at work. Only the highly motivated visit the sites I recommend.

NinaGst9: I'm thinking of joint construction of home pages

RichardJH: excellent idea Nina!

RichardJH: collaborative HPs are great projects

RichardJH: the key is to let students choose the topics

NinaGst9: WebCT homepages are somewhat limited, I think. What other options are there?

RichardJH: geocities web space?

RushtonH: Posting short digital videos can generate a lot of interest.

SteveInGst8: "scrapbooks"

RichardJH: yes! Rushton **KeikoS**: what about blog?

RichardJH: also look at .mac site at Apple **RichardJH**: video shoots are very constructive

RushtonH: Teenagers, in particular, care about doing the job well when they see

themselves.

RichardJH: and involve a lot of negotiation and collaboration

KeikoS . o O (ok...)

RichardJH: yes..they get highly involved in OWNING the finished product

RushtonH: agreed

RichardJH: OWNERSHIP is a big issue

RichardJH: it is THEIR product

RichardJH: what I want to emphasize is a SHARED product

RichardJH: a COMMUNITY product

RichardJH: so Nina's collaborative HPs are a good start

RushtonH: Exactly - it is what you do with their products that determine the effectiveness of shared products.

RichardJH: yes

RichardJH: they have to be working towards the same goal

RichardJH: determining that shared goal is a challenge

AliceW: I'd be really interested in hearing everyone's opinion of 'screen identity' which Richard mentioned in his paper....

NinaGst9: I certainly support letting them pick their own topics, but to what extent is the teaching involved in determining the goal/

RichardJH: this is where the role of teacher as facilitator/moderator comes in..

RichardJH: what is your opinion? Alice..

AliceW: do you think students find it easier to interact on line

RichardJH: for some YES!

AliceW: as someone removed from their real self

RichardJH: especially introverted students

AliceW: but for others?

RichardJH: I think they are more creative when they use another identity...

RushtonH: For many, perhaps it is simply different, and that allows exploring things in new ways, which gives them new experiences to draw upon for their learning.

RichardJH: yes...Rushton

RichardJH: I agree

ShuniI: 15 out of 17 wanted to create their hp's.

KazumiGst6: but when it is done using the class time, it takes up much time, I keep wondering what should come first, esp. when they are beginners taking the Japanese for a few credits, textbook/handout? on to of it is CMC work?

KeikoS: wow

RichardJH: I think it is up to you to decide on textbook v CMCM > Kazumi

RichardJH: CMC

RichardJH: do students think it is work?

RichardJH: I think they do!

RichardJH: so why not give them credit for it!

SteveInGst8: . o O (learning a language is lots of work!)

NinaGst9: it certainly takes a long time to prepare them for the technological side when you are teaching a one-semester class!

RichardJH: but these OCs are so technologically low level

RichardJH: e-mail based **RichardJH**: is enough

KazumiGst6: university assessment regulation dose not allow CMC as part of

assessment sadly to say

RichardJH: yahoo groups site is wonderful!

RushtonH: As with any activity, the operative question is what they are learning as they do it. Can you add language learning to the processes that are part of the tech training? **ShuniI**: In my one-year course students are very much motivated by expectation of email exchange and text chat at TI.

RichardJH: I find that technological issues soon melt into the background

RichardJH: and learning really starts

RichardJH: soon after

NinaGst9: maybe it's because I'm technologically challenged!

AnnaGst10: I am toying with creating a hp with a Japanese tutoring group (using my notebook to create it on, sadly the network is not Japanese friendly). They want to show off where they come from to the local international school owned by a Japanese group. We have good links with them but the kids freeze when they have to speak. But I can't negotiate credit only kudos.

RushtonH: The perfect opportunity to learn with them, perhaps.

RichardJH: our students are getting more and more technologically fluent

AliceW: Don't worry Nina.... you're not alone! :)

AnnaGst10: Kids are teaching me lots of tech stuff. I'm chuffed.

RichardJH: using something like Yahoo Groups is not that challenging guys!

JkfTexaGst11: The technology needs to mature where it is as easy to use as phone,

TV/VCR etc.

RichardJH: (not being patronizing...)

RichardJH: yes jFK RichardJH: it will come RichardJH: IT IS COMING!

NinaGst9: this is true - I've learned a lot from them! I guess I am thinking more in

terms of adding video to hp etc - so far I'm okay with e-mail

SteveInGst8: . o O (keitai)

RichardJH: we can start with simple online communities like Yahoo Groups

RichardJH: mail based

RichardJH: and then move on to multimedia

RichardJH: (multimedia is still hard!)

RushtonH: Apart from the tech issues, students feel strong links to teachers willing to learn with them, as opposed to those teachers who pretend to know it all.

RichardJH: simple HPs are doable **AliceW**: Agree with you Rushton

KazumiGst6: yahoo groups within the class?

RichardJH: YES YES YES Rushton!

RichardJH: yes Kazumi

RichardJH: ALL my classes I teach are in a yahoo group now

AnnaGst10: I never pretend to know. I play the blonde card.

ShuniI: I have my students do the hp in MS word and I convert them into htm.

AliceW: But is it motivating for students to email people who they normally meet face-to-face?

RushtonH: What the student needs to know is that you value them as people who can teach you something.

RichardJH: We know that some of our students know more about this stuff than we do

RichardJH: let them take over! **RichardJH**: give them control!

RichardJH: I would die for a Java programmer in my class!

RichardJH: hahaha

KazumiGst6: what do they discuss in yahoo? do students decide?

RichardJH: yes, they can decide >kazumi

RichardJH: negotiating topics is a great language activity

KazumiGst6: do they actively participate when they see each other f2f every day?

RichardJH: depends on the student...

RushtonH: Helping them take topics you teach them, and exploring how they can be topics that interest them (sometimes aligned) could be cool.

NinaGst9: are we worried about the language they are producing or not? When or do you jump in with any kind of correction, or do you let the students do that for each other?

RichardJH: good point Nina

RushtonH: Make it a natural part of your interaction and not too formal.

RichardJH: peer correction is a good ploy

RichardJH: then final correction by the teacher

RichardJH: that is real collaboration

AliceW: I think that correction takes away from some of the spontaneity of OC

ShuniI: I don't correct.

RichardJH: As teachers we have to hand over some control to students...

AliceW: Maybe correction can happen in other tasks

ButhainaA: Yahoo groups support collaboration, I use them and think they are also great to have students post their homework assignments. They upload them to Files section. I correct them and then they take them back accepting all changes.

KazumiGst6: mmm, what about the real beginners level?

RichardJH: let them decide topics, correct things, discuss, argue etc!

RichardJH: nice Buth! I do it too!

RichardJH: well Kazumi... making the task doable is the challenge!

NinaGst9: I find my students (both native speakers and nns) are sometimes self-conscious if they don't think it's right. Especially Japanese students writing in English

ButhainaA: Another way I use yahoo groups is inviting another teacher to exchange emails with my students on a topic that is related to our subject area.

RichardJH: even at the beginners level I am sure there are some things they can do

RichardJH: don't you?

RushtonH: I'm not opposed to beginners mixing L1 and L2, if it helps them get used to

certain terms.

RichardJH: Nice idea Buth !!!
RichardJH: Never thought of that !

KazumiGst6: mixing Japanese and English?

ButhainaA: Thanks, Richard...

RichardJH: yes that is one option Kazumi

NinaGst9: sure - but sometimes they don't like to post unless they know it's right.

RichardJH: simple jikoshokai at the beginners level is enough>kazumi

RushtonH: Yes - whatever gets them used to what we're learning. Not as good for intermediates.

RichardJH: we have to get them away from RIGHT Nina!!!

ButhainaA: Even with the beginners ,of course they are not as active as the advanced or intermediate level Ss, but it works.

RushtonH: yes

RichardJH: they have to PLAY with language

RichardJH: as they would here **RichardJH**: and make mistakes

RichardJH: take risks

SteveInGst8: well .. it's got to be somewhat age appropriate ...

RichardJH: beginners can't do as much....

RichardJH: but in a community they can observe others and copy what they see

ButhainaA: Yes, that is a good point Nina, but I encourage my students by telling them to post to the list and not to worry about mistakes or errors, this come later.

RichardJH: imagine being in Japan and overhearing people...

RichardJH: you use that language!

RichardJH: so beginners can pick up a lot by participating as observers

KazumiGst6: after a while after introduction etc, is there interesting enough stuff to keep the students going at the beginners level?

RichardJH: in a community discussion

RichardJH: I believe out students have interests >kazumi!

ButhainaA: Yes, Richard, and this is what I've noticed..my students actually writing..the way I greet them and some expressions I use in my postings.

RichardJH: we don't have to decide everything for them...

SteveInGst8: .. it's true that a lot of discussion on fotologs is "that is a pretty picture" "I like that picture" "thank you"

RichardJH: ask them what they want to talk about! >kazumi

SteveInGst8: ... not very philosophical

RichardJH: but true nevertheless> Steve

ButhainaA: I agree, Richard, and I'm glad you have confirmed this to me. Thanks

KazumiGst6: yes they must have something to say, thru CMC

SteveInGst8: ... yes ... it's the "ethnology" of

RichardJH: if they have nothing to say they might as well give up learning Japanese !!!

KeikoS grins

RichardJH: we have to get them away from passiveness!

RichardJH: they must be ACTIVE

MikiGst7 : yes!

SteveInGst8: (even ACTIVE listeners:)

RichardJH: that is what attracted me to Social Constructivism

KazumiGst6: but language level is limited and if they are using mostly English...?

ShuniI: My passive students did pretty well talking to SMU students learning Japanese

last year.

ButhainaA: Active listeners are lurkers? Right?

RichardJH: they will learn the language they need if they have something to say

SteveInGst8: (right!)

RichardJH: If they REALLY want to say it

NinaGst9: do you think it works for every student? some have different goals or needs

RichardJH: as I say if there are MKOs in the community **RichardJH**: lower level learners can seek help (actively!)

RichardJH: from senpai!

RichardJH: lol

RichardJH: (see paper for MKO)

KazumiGst6: can you give me some examples of what they talked about at yahoo groups at beginners level?

RichardJH: yes I think that online communities are open enough to allow for a wide range of goals/interests >Nina

KazumiGst6: are they serious issues? **RichardJH**: do they need to be serious?

SteveInGst8: ... maybe if they are "street corner based" rather than "classroom" based, students will be more comfortable ...

RichardJH: nice thought >steve

SteveInGst8: ... language mall ... not language lab...

RushtonH: One good thing for beginners can be using adverbs to give flavor to what

they like. Do they -really- like it, or is it more of -amari- (not very)?

RichardJH: memo >rush

RichardJH: lol

KazumiGst6: do you encourage lurkers to be more active?

RichardJH: good idea Kazumi...encourage!

RichardJH: not force!

SteveInGst8: ... are anonymous lurkers more active?

KazumiGst6: but do not they feel pressure?

RichardJH: they will come to be more active as time goes by

RichardJH: pressure to participate?

RichardJH: perhaps

RichardJH: but a little pressure is not a bad thing

KazumiGst6: true

RichardJH: we are faced with it all the time here in Japan!

RichardJH: <meetings!! ugh!

RichardJH: haha

SteveInGst8: ... what if lurkers are given "roles" to play ...

KazumiGst6: is there a time when the yahoo group discussion goes quiet too long?

RichardJH: keep going Steve..... **RichardJH**: yes sometimes >kazumi

KazumiGst6: what do you do?

RichardJH: that is where the teacher comes in >kazumi

ButhainaA: I usually provide bonus points for those who are active as a way to motivate

the others.

KazumiGst6: as part of assessment?

RichardJH: think of a good incentive to keep it moving!

RichardJH: a game, prize, event

RichardJH: etc

MikiGst7: good strategy KazumiGst6: sounds fun! RichardJH: nice >Buth

SteveInGst8: ... pokemon stickers for your notebook ...

SteveInGst8: ... hello kitty!

KeikoS grins to Steve

KeikoS: Well...

SteveInGst8: ... younger students don't have the problems older students do ...

ButhainaA: No, Kazumi, I use an online rubric for group assessment, the Bonus points to encourage more postings to our vahoo group list.

RichardJH: I think it is good to mix non and assessed activities

KazumiGst6: do you teach how to use Jap on internet in class for low tech learners by

the way?

MikiGst7: I agree

KeikoS: Folks, we are pretty close to top of the hour... **AnnaGst10**: How do you get around script? Romaji?

KazumiGst6: they seem to feel disadvantaged

RichardJH: ok SteveInGst8: taihen!

KeikoS: I am enjoying the discussion immensely, but I wondered about Richard's

fingers.

RichardJH: hahaha

KeikoS . o O (probably he is fine, chatting all day long.)

RichardJH: < like a pianist!
