PaulR: We've done some fun work in PA

FredK: I am trying to get digital storytelling into the agenda for literacy students in Pushmataha County OK

SusanR: K to 8 Occasional Teacher from Ontario, Canada and facilitator of the K to 3+ Great Resources here at TI

DavidWe: I help math teachers learn more about technology. I'm one of the HelpDesk volunteers. I'm in New Jersey, near New York City

PaulR: I was born just outside of Toronto Susan.

PaulR: Hello to my fellow Canadian. :)

LauraWD: I am a partner in a multimedia storytelling company

PaulR: Wow - neat range

PaulR: Who is your audience Laura?

PaulR: David - we have a special fondness for Math teachers

DavidWe smiles

PaulR: (I'll explain in a bit)

DavidWe: Who is "We", Paul?

PaulR: My twin brother Peter

LauraWD: we purchased August House Publishing last year and we are building the live event and tv/movie performance aspects. Also building animation. Very focused on children.

DavidWe nods

PaulR: and my company FableVision

PaulR: What is the name of your company Laura?

LauraWD: August House, Inc.

PaulR: ah

LauraWD: we kept the name

PaulR: August House looks very much like our cup of tea

DavidWe smiles

LauraWD: you just looked at the web site!

PaulR: yup

DavidWe: You know Tom Snyder, Paul?

PaulR: Love technology. :)

DavidWe smiles

PaulR: Yes -

LauraWD: it has so many affordances

DavidWe . o O (Swarthmore College - class of '72)

PaulR: Peter worked with Tom in the earliest days of TSP

DavidWe nods

PaulR: Tom hired Peter in 1982

DavidWe smiles

PaulR: and Peter spent 13 years there

DavidWe: cool

DavidWe has heard Tom Snyder play guitar

PaulR: as VP/Creative Director

PaulR thinks Tom looked like John Lennon

DavidWe smiles

PaulR: Tom told Peter:

PaulR: I don't know what I want you to do

PaulR: yet

PaulR: so go into Harvard Square

PaulR: relax, have coffee, draw

DavidWe: sounds like Tom

PaulR: until I can think of something

LauraWD: guys if I fall off it is because I've got a computer battery that is dying...would love to stay involved in this group and conversation...

PaulR: Peter had two glorious days of bumming around HSq

PaulR: Laura - would love to stay in touch

PaulR: if we lose you . . .

PaulR: paul@fablevision.com

LauraWD: <u>laura@augusthouse.com</u> background on website

PaulR: cool

PaulR: Are people familiar with my brother Peter H. Reynolds?

PaulR: or FableVision?

DavidWe: I'm not

PaulR: Not sure where to begin our adventures tonight

PaulR: but that might be a start

BjB agrees

FredK: Not me.

PaulR: He is my co-navigator on the journey.

SusanR: Fablevision

PaulR: Peter left TSP about 10 years ago

PaulR: the first time they were bought (now owned by Scholastic)

PaulR: They made him sign a five year non-compete

PaulR: to stay out of the ed tech market

PaulR: to get his nest egg

PaulR: The funny thing is that films and books were considered 'technology"

PaulR: so we launched FableVision during the 5 year period

PaulR: and published THE NORTH STAR

PaulR: online version available for free

PaulR: http://www.fablevision.com/northstar

PaulR: http://www.fablevision.com/northstar/read.html

LauraWD left the room (signed off).

PaulR: Read that - and you get our philosophy

PaulR: And we created our own animated films

PaulR: that have traveled around the world

PaulR: been broadcast, etc.

PaulR: Peter is also a NY Times Best Selling author/illustrator now

DavidWe: That's great

PaulR: JUDY MOODY is the big hit

PaulR: if you were in 3rd grade and a girl

PaulR: you'd be squealing now

DavidWe has been in 3rd grade, but...

PaulR smiles

PaulR: His other big books are THE DOT

PaulR: and ISH

DebraM joined the room.

DavidWe waves to Debra

DavidWe: Hi, Debra. Welcome

PaulR: Hi Debra

FredK: Hi Debra

PaulR: At FableVision - our mission is to tell "stories that matter, stories that move"

DavidWe: Do you know about Edutopia, Paul?

PaulR: We tell stories that help people navigate their full potential

PaulR: Yes - great resource

PaulR: Peter and I were interviewed by Milton Chen

DebraM: This discuss[ion] sounds interesting. One thing I know about African-American students, storytelling is part of their culture

HeatherBu joined the room.

PaulR: there's a good audio file up there somewhere on that

DavidWe believes story-telling is part of ALL cultures

FredK: Our literacy council mission is to help people meet personal goals through literacy

PaulR: Hello Heather - welcome aboard.

HeatherBu: thank you. My apologies for being so late.

PaulR: That's great Fred.

PaulR: Debra - interesting.

PaulR: We think we should all be telling more stories

PaulR: listening to more stories

DebraM: I use storytelling for explaining concepts for all subjects.

PaulR: It is the oldest "storage device" known to humankind

DavidWe: NPR's been doing a great service by reviving the "This I Believe" series - very moving accounts

PaulR: I love that series David

PaulR: We urge children (and grown up children)

PaulR: to find their story

PaulR: and tell it,

PaulR: write it

PaulR: draw it

PaulR: share it

DebraM: Can you give me more information on the "This I Believe" series

PaulR: It is how we connect most deeply

DavidWe is looking for the web page

PaulR: Thanks David

FredK . o O (now we are getting to the nitty gritty)

BjB listens to Paul

DavidWe: http://www.npr.org/templates/story/story.php?storyId=4538138

PaulR: http://www.fablevision.com/hewasme

PaulR: I love NPR - a great example of wonderful storytelling

PaulR: I've been teaching for 17 years

PaulR: university level - at Boston College

PaulR: and always get my students to tune into public radio

DavidWe smiles

PaulR: it's a terrific way to hear well-crafted stories - that rely on great writing,

PaulR: audio, sound design

DavidWe agrees

PaulR: the little featurettes are best examples

DebraM: thanks for that information. I teach middle school and they like to talk, so storytelling is a way to help them learn and organize their thoughts.

PaulR: Our focus at FableVision is bringing stories to life

HeatherBu . o O (The "driveway moments")

PaulR: through animation

DavidWe: Also the Story Corps project:

DavidWe: http://www.npr.org/templates/story/story.php?storyId=4516989

PaulR: on film, web, kiosk, etc.

PaulR: delivery platform doesn't matter to us

PaulR: The North Star is a good story for young and old alike

PaulR: to remind us to navigate a meaningful learning journey

PaulR: it started as a conversation with a teacher in the South

PaulR: who was literally in tears

DebraM: My students enjoy being in front of the camera

PaulR: because she knew what she was being asked to teach

PaulR: wasn't everything her kids needed

PaulR: The North Star helps shine light on four questions

PaulR: Where have you been?

PaulR: Where are you now?

PaulR: Where are you going?

PaulR: and most importantly

PaulR: Where do you WANT to be going?

DavidWe smiles

PaulR: That last one is the hardest to reconcile with the 3rd sometimes

PaulR: Even as adults we can feel lost

PaulR: "This is not the place I want to be"

PaulR: Learning is about finding your way.

FredK: We try to bring out their goals

PaulR: And the power of story can help us discover clues

PaulR: I popped a link in earlier

PaulR: for HE WAS ME

PaulR: did you see it?

DebraM: Can't feeling lost help to ignite the students' imagination

PaulR: http://www.fablevision.com/hewasme

PaulR: When we're done

PaulR: make some tea

PaulR: nestle in

PaulR: and watch

PaulR: Yes Debra

PaulR: as long as there are ways to help them navigate their way forward

PaulR: But "lost" can often times feel like frustration

PaulR: or failure

PaulR: We love "off the path" kids

PaulR: the ones who don't fit in

PaulR: or are challenged in some ways

PaulR: We need to let them know it will be okay

DavidWe nods

PaulR: that the "one size fits all" path isn't the only way forward

HeatherBu: that is so true for the middle school kids

PaulR: and that where a great teacher

PaulR: can use story to connect

PaulR: and guide

DebraM: Not if you guide them through it. This can be an very important life skill. I am going to take your advice, but first I want to investigate that web site. bye

PaulR: Good luck Debra

DebraM: Thanks

DavidWe waves

PaulR: Guidance is important

PaulR: a gift you can give.

PaulR: Let me know what you think.

PaulR: after you've explored.

DebraM left the room (signed off).

PaulR: We give many of our stories away for free

PaulR: and they've been used by teachers all over the world

PaulR: The North Star was turned into a musical

PaulR: and a 3rd grade curriculum kit

BjB: I don't recall if you have a link on your site to lessons, Paul?

PaulR: and adopted as a theme for entire schools

SusanR: Is there a Fablevision television series?

PaulR: I'm actually building a North Star Community of Practice site

SusanR is interested in the Kit

PaulR: as part of my action research project

PaulR: in the Pepperdine OMET program

PaulR: will have a place to access/share lesson plans

DavidWe waves to Jeff

BjB waves to Jeff

FredK waves

HeatherBu: I was just looking at your "Field Guide." You have some wonderful tips in there.

PaulR: Thanks Heather

PaulR: Hello Jeff

SusanR: Just finished watching HeWasMe

PaulR: We love sharing what we do

PaulR smiles

PaulR: The Dot and Ish are now both animated films too

PaulR: The Dot won ALA's Carnegie Medal of Excellence last year

PaulR: I love that story

PaulR: another Peter Reynolds story

PaulR: about a little girl who thinks she can't draw

PaulR: and the teacher who thinks differently

PaulR: The story is now in over 20 languages

PaulR: the Mexican gov't just bought 200,000 copies

DavidWe: wow

PaulR: for every classroom in Mexico

DavidWe: congratulations

PaulR: Thanks David

PaulR: We have been amazed

HeatherBu: I can't wait to share the library with some of my teachers...and my students!

PaulR: that the stories have such universal appeal

PaulR: but that is the power of story

PaulR: That's great Heather

PaulR: Peter is very good about writing back to students who write him

PaulR: his publishing site is . . .

PaulR: http://www.peterhreynolds.com

PaulR: Our cell split 45 years ago

PaulR: and we've been enjoying each other's company ever since

PaulR: I really admire him

DavidWe grins

PaulR: and he inspires me

PaulR: that's why it's hard to call what we do work

PaulR: it is so nourishing

PaulR: and fun

PaulR: oh -

PaulR: you're all invited

PaulR: to a BIG PARTY

PaulR: Sept 15th

PaulR: in Boston

DavidWe: what time?

DavidWe smiles

PaulR: We're celebrating our 10th Anniversary of FableVision

PaulR: and our NEW HOME . .

BjB. o O (David never misses a party)

PaulR: at the Boston Children's Museum

BjB: how exciting!

DavidWe wouldn't want to offend the hosts

PaulR: We're building out the space this summer

PaulR: seriously - invite is open

PaulR: if you all like stories

DavidWe will put it on the calendar

PaulR: then you're our kind of people

DavidWe: Will you be at NECC in San Diego, Paul?

PaulR: presenting my final research and finishing my M.A. work

PaulR: and I'm sure Peter is speaking too

PaulR: I'll be at NECC next year

PaulR: I go to many of the conferences

BjB needs to send David her copy of the North Star so he can get it autographed

SusanR: Thanks Heather

DavidWe will be happy to get it autographed

PaulR: You have a copy Bj?

BjB nods

BjB: Love it!

SusanR: Where is NECC next year?

PaulR: Yay

PaulR: hmm

PaulR: not sure

DavidWe . o O (Atlanta, I think)

BjB hopes Paul remembers to tell David about the math connection

PaulR: btw, we also launched our own bookstore

BjB. o O (or show him where to read about it)

PaulR: The Blue Bunny

PaulR: http://www.dedhambluebunny.com

PaulR: you can order personalized/autographed copies of Peter's books

PaulR: ah yes . . .

PaulR: Math.

MargaretR joined the room.

DavidWe waves to Margaret

PaulR: Hello Margaret

DavidWe: Hi, Margaret. Welcome

BjB waves to Margaret

MargaretR: HI

FredK waves

PaulR: I had to abandon Margaret to come over here!

MargaretR: I am not going to stay long

PaulR: do you forgive me?

DavidWe: Neither are we

PaulR smiles and blushes

BjB: thanks for sharing Paul with us, Margaret

MargaretR: I just wanted to see how our star story telling is doing

PaulR: as much as I love Math"

PaulR: He asked Peter to

PaulR: take his Math book home

PaulR: and do Mr. Matson a favor

PaulR: "Find anything lesson in the book . . .

PaulR: and THAT'S who Tom asked "Do you know any talented artists who can help me with this company I'm launching?"

PaulR: Pretty neat, eh?

DavidWe smiles

DavidWe: very

PaulR: THAT is the power

PaulR: of a teacher who creatively makes connections

PaulR: to a student's interests

PaulR: you can teach almost anything that way
