BjB: created by John Scieska of stinky cheese man fame

BjB. o O (and the true story of the three little pigs)

KathrynHu: and the Time Warp Trio

BjB: Jeff, she has two newsletters. One is for kids

BjB. o O (probably the one you have to get permission for)

HeatherBu . o O (leave it to Jeff)

JeffC: hehe

BjB: Beyond Books

BjB: Look beyond traditional avenues to get your kids to read. Encourage them to read

BjB: kids' meal boxes and bags, restaurant kids' menus, cereal boxes, billboard signs,

BjB: and drink caps (such as Snapple). Play literacy and reading games in the car. There

BjB: are several listed on my website, <u>http://www.storyconnection.net</u>. Click on Parent

BjB: Connection. Sign your kids up for my Passport Kids Club, a quarterly newsletter,

BjB: which highlights a country, its customs, its animals, and a story. It's educational,

BjB: but still a lot of fun!

BjB. o O (from the newsletter)

BjB: The next thing I wanted to point out is something you will like, Jeff

BjB: Dianne has set up a page at My Space

HeatherBu: lol

HeatherBu: Jeff, a new friend for you

KathrynHu: v cool

BjB: <u>http://www.myspace.com/storyconnection</u>

BjB: the reason that this drew my attention was that in the newsletter...

BjB: she shares a story where a child who had attended one of her storytelling workshops...

BjB: told her how much she enjoyed the experience

BjB: Dianne said that she gets lots of feedback from teachers and adults, but rarely has the opportunity to get feedback from the kids

DavidJQ joined the room.

BjB: hi, David. Welcome

HeatherBu: I've tried, from time to time.

BjB: or have a favorite site they want to share, a special storyteller?

BjB: Dianne also has a page for parents and kids

PennyH: I agree telling stories is an integral part of our lives. I use it so much in class just to let my students know that I am human. They understand me more too. Making connections!!

KathrynHu: aah

BjB: I find that we take a lot of that for granted. Many of my kids have not had the experience of someone reading them a story

BjB: the topic of listening skills that was brought up earlier is another skill that I try to work on

HeatherBu nods

JeffC doesn't think anyone heard you Bj.

KathrynHu: heh

BjB grins

HeatherBu likes to listen to BJ

GlynnB: We men have to learn a lot about listening skills

HeatherBu smiles gently at her hubby

FredK . o O (I'm all ears)

SusanR: Kids find it difficult to listen for any length of time

JeffC: Because we were raised to tune out.

GlynnB: and not try to fix anything

BjB: isn't just a gender thing, Glynn

PennyH: Wow excellent resource

GlynnB: Depends which gender you are.

KathrynHu: Since my students have a separate Reading teacher, I end up reading stories to my kids that I want them to respond to in writing.

GlynnB: I'm still learning from Heather

BjB: cool, Kathryn

KathrynHu: ty

BjB: I've subscribed to SimplyAudio books on CDs...

BjB: it's been a very interesting experience LEARNING to LISTEN to stories without seeing the words in print

HeatherBu: I used that at the end of this last semester...

KathrynHu: how?

BjB: many libraries have books on tape or CD

HeatherBu: while the kids were working on their various Tech projects,

HeatherBu: we had Harry Potter playing in the background

JoshG: when I was in 3rd grade I didn't like reading but I got an audio book on the first Harry Potter book and have bean reading every since

HeatherBu: They would remind me, each day, to get it started.

PennyH: Books on tape are excellent for differentiation

HeatherBu: Today's kids are so much better than I am at multi-tasking.

KathrynHu: How so, please?

HeatherBu: Great, Josh

BjB: cool, Heather. Kids have a real problem VISUALIZING a story

KathrynHu: I agree

BjB listens to Josh

SusanR: Students can make their own connections

PennyH: That's difficulty with making connections b/c of lack of knowledge- perhaps?

BjB agrees with Penny...prior knowledge is very limited for many

PennyH: definitely Susan

HeatherBu: Penny, can you talk more about the differentiation?

JoshG: the story teller in the Harry Potter book was so good about using different tones and characters it made me think and before then I didn't do that

PennyH: But not all children have the resources to make the connections to some things that are taught

BjB smiles. Excellent, Josh! Thanks

PennyH: Sure, we all know that we all learn differently- some of us are auditory, visual, tactile, kinesthetic learners. Some vary from one are to the other. I learn by listening and doing (auditory and tactile)

JoshG: I learn by visualizing it and that's why I love reading

JoshG: and listening

JoshG: to great stories

KathrynHu: Me, too - the words go from my eyes to my "inner" ear

PennyH: For example, I tell history stories to my students about living in the 1960's during the Civil Rights Movement and they can understand that better than reading it from the book sometimes

HeatherBu nods

JoshG: agrees I've been there

PennyH: Sometimes called "selective hearing" lol

JoshG: it is

HeatherBu: It's also important outside the classroom...we're trying to share the family stories when we get together, so they don't get lost.

PennyH: absolutely, I cherish the stories from my great aunts, uncles and great grandparents- talk about great resources

GlynnB: oral tradition no less

PennyH: Wow, that reminds me to reread the story The Watsons Go to Birmingham. This is a great storytelling book.

FredK: I liked Steve Hartman's "Everyone has a story" reports

JeffC: have them read the last few pages of Fahrenheit 451

HeatherBu: oh yes!

PennyH: I'll have to check that out

KathrynHu: oooh, good idea

HeatherBu: Fred? URL?

GlynnB: I have told stories, to my students, as if it happened to me and was able to describe the emotions, pain etc of the event.

FredK: He was a news reporter on CBS I think
