BjB: TED is a very cool organization...they have a newsletter...

BjB: one of the recent videos that was featured is by Yves Behar: Creating objects that tell stories

BjB: After I watched the video, I thought the idea of ordinary objects as the subject for stories was intriguing

BeverlyD: I agree

BjB: I'm going to give you the url for the video...it's about 17 minutes long. Take a look and then come back to the chat and we'll discuss.

KourtneyH: ok

BeverlyD: ok

JennyEB: Maybe you could give some highlights?

BjB: he takes ordinary objects and rethinks not just the design, but also how the object is used/what is the purpose of the object

JennyEB: This may sound stupid, but I have collected a large amount of various "stress balls" in a whole lot of different shapes, brain, heart, apple, comfy chair, plus sign

JennyEB: While they aren't as Extraordinary

JennyEB: as the object he describes

JennyEB: I wonder if they might not be inspiration for my students

JennyEB : to tell a story

BjB: If you are creative in your presentation, that creativity will be contagious

BjB : watch the bottles thing...this is soooo cool

JennyEB: that's right where I am

JennyEB: it would make a great stress ball!

JennyEB : cool

JennyEB: marketing, values, soul?

JennyEB: I can't say I've heard those three words together lately

BjB nods solemnly

JennyEB: Is he actually representing marketers who are promoting practical items that will be durable and useful?

BjB: I think he's representing himself as a designer of objects

JennyEB: This sounds like ethical marketing!

BjB gasps! What a novel idea.

JennyEB: What's this world coming to? Good v. evil and good wins?

BjB: as a side comment, I posted this info to the artssites discussion:

BjB: One Laptop Per Child makes beautiful music

BjB: The computers being sent all over the world by Boston nonprofit group One Laptop Per Child contain a piece of music-producing software that has, somewhat unexpectedly, been bringing families and children from different countries together. BjB smiles...me too

BjB: I liked the idea of not just creating a 'skin' for a product

JennyEB: does TED generally have inspirational hopeful stories like this?

BeverlyD: I like the photography. I looked more at the technical. Was that time lapsed?

BjB: no...time is very fast in cyberspace

BjB: TED sponsored Pangea Day...did anyone see that?

BjB . o O (speaking of human rights)

JennyEB: heard about it, didn't quite get it

KourtneyH: I liked how he brought us thru the whole process of idea to product

KourtneyH: no I haven't heard of that

JennyEB: so these are the talented people who really are interested in making a better

world, not just a buck?

BjB: The theme of the festival this year is Beyond Conflict: Building Peaceful Communities

JennyEB : ahhhh

KourtneyH: this really is cool

BjB: yes...some powerful videos

KourtneyH: I am watching one now

BjB: which one, Kourtney?

KourtneyH: stille post (telephone game)

BjB nods

JennyEB: I'm watching a thousand words

BeverlyD: I just reviewing the site.

KourtneyH: I just started yours jenny

BeverlyD: like Yellow sticky notes

JennyEB: to be inspired

JennyEB: to share with our students

JennyEB : to create our own

JennyEB: to TELL our own stories

BjB: Rushton leads a monthly discussion for NextVista in Tapped In

BjB listens to Jenny

BjB . o O (I'm jealous that you're at a writing institute!)

JennyEB: I think this one's been on youtube

JennyEB: I'm guessing I could link it to our writing project wiki

JennyEB : I can't wait to share

KourtneyH: thousand words was really good

JennyEB: don't you want to finish the story?

KourtneyH: exactly

JennyEB : I just got the title

JennyEB : duh

BjB wonders if all stories should have a 'finish'

JennyEB: none do but it would be fun

BjB . o O (or should they just make you want to finish the story)

JennyEB: to see the different

JennyEB: ways they could end

JennyEB: depending on the teller

BjB: yep

KourtneyH: or the way we think or create the ends

BjB: look at all the variations of Cinderella or The Three Little Pigs

JennyEB: video writing prompt?

KourtneyH: our selves

BjB: good idea, Jenny

KourtneyH: what do you mean...sorry for the stupid question

JennyEB: show the video

JennyEB: ask for the story to be finished

JennyEB: OR ask them to tell

BjB: same thing can be done with a work of art

JennyEB: another story using PICTURES

JennyEB: that tell a thousand words

BjB : righto

JennyEB: or an object

KourtneyH: gotcha

JennyEB: like what's his name

JennyEB: I'm about to explode with inspiration

JennyEB : Dare I say it

JennyEB: I wish I had to teach school tomorrow!

BjB laughs...a true educator ;-)

JennyEB: At least I get to see a bunch of psyched up educators!

BjB: Jenny, you'll always find psyched up educators in Tapped In!

JennyEB: that's why I'm here!

BjB cheers

JennyEB: I'm dying to get back to Pangea Day and TED
