BJB2: the group was originally started as a workshop for the National Gallery of Art

DeannaLJ: Great!

MariaMR: Good!

BJB2: this first one I got from Teaching Tolerance today...

BJB2: it's called the Story Corner and is "The Three Billy Goats Gracious"

BJB2: "The Three Billy Goats Gracious"; a retelling of "The Three Billy Goats Gruff," written by Teaching Tolerance Director Jennifer Holladay, puts a cooperative twist on the traditional Norwegian tale.

BJB2: you may need to hold down the ctrl key on your keyboard when you click on the url I'm going to show you. That overrides pop up blockers

KristinaK: and I can't copy and paste it either

DeannaLJ: I clicked on it and lost the conversation page! Help!

BJB2: Kristina, make sure you don't have a window minimized

BJB2: you can also go to the Actions menu in the top right of the chat and select Send to Pasteboard

BJB2: from the pasteboard you can copy the url

BJB2: did everyone get the url now?

MariaMR: Yes!

EeC: Yes.

EduardoM: yes, and done

KristinaK: thank you

DeannaLJ: Yes

BJB2: does anyone see any value in this story for the classroom?

BJB2 . o O (and for what grades?)

DeannaLJ: I was a 6th grade teacher. I could use this for them.

EduardoM: the value of helping people

EeC: I think it would be good for different versions of fairy tales which they do for 2nd grade.

MariaMR: I think it can also be use in elementary

KristinaK: in kindergarten I could use to talk about dealing with problems in a non confrontational manner.

BJB2: oh, great ideas!

EduardoM: for language schools in Brazil, it would be for Intermediate level up

EeC: I also like it for finding solutions to a problem-for elementary!

BJB2: can even be for high school...rewrite a story that teaches a lesson

GeorgetteJ: this would help in a leadership class as well.

DeannaLJ: This could also be used in dealing with bullies and that there might be a reason for their anger that has nothing to do with the target.

BJB2: hmmm...good thought, Deanna

EduardoM: yes

EduardoM: I agree, bulling

BJB2: ready for another resource?

MariaMR: Yes!

DeannaLJ: sure

EduardoM: yes

EeC: YEs

KristinaK: yes

LizethV: yes

GeorgetteJ: sure

DeannaLJ nods

MariaMR: It looks for older grades

BJB2: it's good for adolescents...authentic stories

LizethV: looks user friendly and I think it would help students cope with various issues and questions in mind.

EeC: I can see LA teachers using this as an example to get teens to write.

BJB2: yes, Lizeth

KristinaK: I would have loved this when I was younger.

LizethV: me too

MariaMR: I agree

SergioV joined the room.
