JohnathanC: focusing on values... empathy, tolerance, social responsibility...

LauraRa: Ohh .. okay. I see

JohnathanC: also called social and emotional learning

LauraRa: What kinds of songs are they?

JohnathanC: I'll share some samples with you

LauraRa: okay ...

BJB2: when John shows you a url, Laura, hold down the ctrl key on your keyboard when

you click

JohnathanC: We are going over to another site called Classroom 2.0 where I have a

profile

JohnathanC: It is a social network for teachers

LauraRa: okay

JeffC joined the room.

BJB2 waves hi to Jeff

JeffC waves

JeffC is still helping one of Kim Greene's students... wanted to check in and see what's happenin' though.

JohnathanC: Click on the video to watch it and when finished click on the link posted below it to check out the assignment

LauraRa: You have some really interesting project and pictures on your site!!

JohnathanC: thanks

LauraRa: Honestly, I would not consider using songs unless I had to

BJB2: why is that, Laura?

BJB2 . o O (kids love music)

JohnathanC: what!?

LauraRa: Well, it's just the last thing on my mind. True .. even the magic school bus

LauraRa: Honestly speaking, like before I came to this chat

JohnathanC: ok

LauraRa: (just an idea BUT not impossible)

LauraRa: Yes

LauraRa: I am

JohnathanC: her song change?

LauraRa: yeah ..

LauraRa: This is really impressive stuff.

LauraRa: Honestly, I have been trying my hardest to not make activities so old fashioned ... more of that hands-on and getting students to think is what I try for. I like being known as the student teacher who does more

LauraRa: many of my students get excited to just know that I'm doing science

LauraRa: I know see that not only can you go hands-on but you can go further

JohnathanC: that's good that you are so motivated

LauraRa: There is a way to tap into their minds and get to them'

LauraRa: Well I just like it that students want to be there, they want "me" to teach them

JohnathanC: There are a number of science teachers and discussions at classroom 2.0

LauraRa: looking up information is time consuming but well worth it when others give you props for what you do

JohnathanC: many elementary teachers

LauraRa: Honestly, I am considering going to middle school. Not just yet but in the near future
