BridgetM: when I was on tech committee there was only one

SusanR . o O (harassment policy)

BridgetM: I have to check email daily at school. I give kids and parents that address

BridgetM: no one uses it

GailH: I also hear of teachers who are overwhelmed with too much email from parents.

SusanR: yes

BridgetM: I can imagine that. I've been lucky

SusanR: I would have a site for class communication...no two way communication

BridgetM: home email address - I've given that to parents who have helped with big projects

SusanR: should we take a look at some end of the year games and resources

GailH nods.

BridgetM: all our work addresses are the same pattern so anyone could figure that out

BridgetM: yes - something fun

BJB2 waits for Sue to share her end of the year games and resources

SusanR: can anyone share a successful end of the year project

SusanR: our school has a circus for K to 6 students run by the grade 6's

BridgetM: wow

BridgetM: annual event?

SusanR: and the grade 6 students are involved in putting on Macbeth by Shakespeare

GailH: Very ambitious!

SusanR: yes both are annual events

SusanR: a lot of classes create board games based on concepts learned throughout the year

GailH . o O (Having taught high school, our end of year activities were more around final exams and graduation....)

BridgetM: some classes do cross age literacy activities at my school but no big school wide thing

SusanR: most of the testing is done by the end of May

BridgetM: In RR I've helped 5th graders write picture books for younger kids

GailH: Is RR reading recovery?

BridgetM: sorry - resource room - typically 37 mins / day

SusanR: do you use video games with your youngsters, Bridget

BridgetM: no. I wanted to teach older kids to make hot potatoes exercises this year - for the younger kids - but my whole case load changed the week before school started

SusanR: There are studies showing impressive perceptual gains after just a short time playing a game.

SusanR: Use these flash games as a warm-up to the start of the day or close the day with these adorable and (mostly) benevolent Web games

SusanR: you can bounce stars off bubbles, help a panda romp through a bamboo forest, save a runaway train (and yourself) from destruction, photograph UFOs

SusanR: *To give it an educational slant why not have the students choose a game and write out the instructions or directions.

SusanR: and/or do an oral presentation

BridgetM: I like this idea

BridgetM: I have a class job "computer technician" . student could learn game then teach it

GailH: I tried the bauns one, with the primary colors (on the left). I am not sure what I am doing, but I like it.

GailH: Great idea, Bridget.

SusanR: I have had grade 8 students enjoying orisinal

SusanR: I have used this site with spec ed students .. Power Proofreading

SusanR: This site is a place filled with proofreading games to play. After watching the thunderstorm, click in the middle of the screen to begin Power Proofreading

BridgetM: I like the cranky crabs

SusanR: editing, grammar

SusanR: after working with these silly passages kids can create their own

SusanR: certificates of achievement can be printed out

GailH: I like that one. Particularly that there are all those choices I can make.

SusanR: Gail, this one I picked up from ENC..engage students by having them create a garden plot around the school

GailH: I don't think I've explored it much.

SusanR: what about Pest World for Kids

SusanR: PestWorld for Kids brings you face-to-face with the fascinating world of pests.

BridgetM: well, that's cool. I wanted to read about bachelor buttons tonight & did at that site

BridgetM: love those bugs.

SusanR: I am looking at your photo Bridget!! This next site comes to mind Educational science entertainment about yucky things such as worms.

GailH: There are so many sites worthy of investigating more.

BridgetM: I've used this site - slimy version!

GailH: It can be a very good Professional Development activity, and they learn about the content too.

SusanR: and one more for science consolidation

SusanR: Who Wants to Win a Million Dollars? - The Science Game

SusanR: Students answer 15 science and math questions to win one million (fake!) dollars!

SusanR: set of index cards and some key concepts/content to consolidate in various subject areas and students can create their own....
