SusanR: Tonight's session..Sites that Sizzle

JulieSK: I teach 8th grade

DavidWe imagines that we can come up with SOMETHING for middle schoolers

SusanR: Our special guests, David and Bj will certainly be able to contribute to your Middle School needs

JulieSK: Thank you

SusanR: David and Bj recently returned from NECC

JulieSK: it will be appreciated

DavidWe looks at Bj

DavidWe: You go first, Bj, okay?

BJB2 thinks about what middle school events she attended.

JulieSK: Conferences?

BJB2: I know there was a LOT of digital storytelling, Julie

JulieSK: Did any of the storytelling have to do with Math?

SusanR: NECC is one of the largest technology conference for teachers and technology coordinators

JeffC: There's a Math Resources group here Julie... I'll send you a private chat message on how to join it.

JulieSK: Thanks

BJB2: you could use a digital story to tell the history of a math person...

JulieSK: how do you complete a digital story?

BJB2: or to 'prove' a solution to a problem

JulieSK: those are great ideas!

BJB2: a digital story is using images and text to communicate an idea

BJB2: there is a storytelling group that you can also join

BarbaraPh: So are we talking about powerpoint or something?

BJB2: digital stories can be done in powerpoint...or using one of the programs like photostory for window

BJB2: Mac also has a digital storytelling program

SusanR: What is it Bj

BJB2: iMovie

JulieSK: I participated in a workshop about iMovie earlier this summer

JulieSK: It's very cool

SusanR: Perhaps we should have a monthly Digital Storytelling calendar ASO, Bj

DavidWe: Sounds good to me

BJB2: http://www.storyphoto.com/multimedia/multimedia links.html

DavidWe: There is a LOT of interest in using iMovie and using video over the web

DavidWe: Met an interesting guy in Philly with a cool site for DV (digital video)

SusanR: Bj, David.. did either of you come across some digital storytelling ideas or links at NECC?

BJB2: one of the events during the festival on July 20 will be about digital storytelling

JulieSK: I know Apple has some links on their website

DavidWe met Mr. Digital Video for Apple - George Cook

JulieSK: nice

BJB2: I also attended a Visual Literacy discussion at NECC led by Lynell Burmark

SusanR: What is the learning curve for imovie, David?

DavidWe imagines that there is always more to learn, but since it is an Apple product, it probably isn't too bad

JeffC: It's an easy program Susan... but hard if you don't have a Mac.

SusanR: I am a Mac person!!

DavidWe: Video is challenging: between sound and lighting - to do it well is something different than just DOING it

DavidWe agrees with Susan

SusanR: I have had experience with iphoto

SusanR: time consuming but intuitive

JulieSK: what is iPhoto?

DavidWe: I believe that regardless of the ease of use of software, you still need to play around with it before it gets comfortable and you can start to use it as a teaching tool

SusanR: extensive

JeffC: iphoto is a very cool program for arranging photos and creating web pages... mac only.

JeffC . o O (exteensive is what middle schools are... too many of them.)

JulieSK: I agree

BJB2 chuckles

JulieSK: they would love creating web pages!

JulieSK: I am still so new at this technology stuff!

JeffC: Here's a great site for creating webpages: http://www.freewebs.com

JulieSK: I don't know if I am capable of helping them when they need it

BJB2: most people are, Julie

JulieSK: thanks

SusanR: play and explore, Julie

DavidWe: Well, Julie, that's why we are here - to help lend you some experienced hands

SusanR: I have something to play with and explore

JulieSK: I'm finding that out

SusanR: a site that sizzles

JulieSK: ready

SusanR: I want your impressions

SusanR: whether it has a place in the classroom or your curriculum

SusanR: It's Montage a Google

SusanR: no relationship to google

JulieSK: do you have the url?

BarbaraPh: Do you mean does digital storytelling have a place generally in our classrooms?

SusanR: Two Google games for weekend diversion, both by Flash animator

SusanR: Grant Robinson

SusanR: I have the link

SusanR: I will let you play with it

SusanR: Have some fun with this

SusanR: a Flash-based montage creator that grabs content from Google image search. Minutes upon minutes of fun.

SusanR: Ready.. come back in a few moments and comment http://grant.robinson.name/projects/montage-a-google/

JeannieA joined the room.

SusanR: Topic tonight is fairly general

DavidWe waves to Jeannie

DavidWe: Hi, Jeannie. Welcome

SusanR: Sites that Sizzle..can cover any topic

JeannieA: Hi, sorry to be so late. I wasn't watching the clock.

SusanR: Our special guests are David and BJ who were lucky enough to attend NECC

SusanR: Jeannie..take a look at montage a Google http://grant.robinson.name/projects/montage-a-google/

DavidWe . o O (pardon the interruption - but I think it's the first time they've played the British National Anthem at an American All-Star baseball game)

SusanR: click on the collaged poster and enter keywords such as Van Gogh or Georgia O'keefe

SusanR: or whatever suits your fancy

SusanR: Where David

DavidWe . o O (just now in Detroit)

SusanR: "God Save Our Queen"

DavidWe nods

SusanR: that's ours as well we are part of the British Commonwealth

JulieSK: I typed in a few math words and came up with a beautiful picture

JulieSK: cool site!

BJB2: here's some comic relief from an actual middle school exam: The greatest writer of the Renaissance was William Shakespear. Shakespear never made much money and is famous only because of his plays. He lived in Windsor with his merry wives, writing tragedies, comedies and errors. In Shakespear's famous play, Hamlet rations out his situation by relieving himself in a long soliloquy. In another, Lady Macbeth tries to convince Macbeth to kill the King by attacking his manhood. Romeo and Juliet are an example of a heroic couplet. Writing at the same time as Shakespear was Miquel Cervantes. He wrote 'Donkey Hote'. The next great author was John Milton. Milton wrote 'Paradise Lost.' Then his wife died and he wrote 'Paradise Regained.'

BJB2: The inhabitants of Egypt were called mummies. They lived in the Sarah Dessert and travelled by Camelot. The climate of the Sarah is such that the inhabitants have to live elsewhere, so certain areas of the dessert are cultivated by irritation. The Egyptians built the Pyramids in the shape of a huge triangular cube. The Pyramids are a range of mountains between France and Spain.

JeannieA: Wow! That's awesome!

JulieSK: sounds typical

SusanR: btw..when we were in London this past fall we saw the Complete Works of Shakespeare

SusanR: a comedy

DavidWe. o O (in 15 minutes - the compressed version?)

SusanR: Compressed

DavidWe smiles

SusanR: they also do the Bible

JulieSK: I just watched Shakespeare in love

DavidWe: I was Demetrius and wore red tights in a high school production of "Midsummer Night's Dream"

SusanR: This is a Middle School math site for Julie http://www.digicc.com/fido/

DavidWe: Do you know about the Math Forum - www.mathforum.org - Julie?

JulieSK: yes, I've used math forum quite a bit

DavidWe: I was there at the beginning....

DavidWe smiles

JeffC: <u>http://scholar.google.com/</u> ...for searching research

SusanR: Would you mention Math Tools please, David

DavidWe: The other big web site for math AND science that I believe everyone should know about is the Eisenhower National Clearinghouse - <u>www.enc.org</u>

DavidWe: Math Tools

DavidWe looks at Susan

JeannieA: Will that provide full text articles?

DavidWe: http://www.mathforum.org/mathtools/

SusanR: Thanks David

DavidWe: I'm not sure what you are asking, Jeannie?

DavidWe: Math Tools has downloaded applets (JAVA) that illustrate a wide range of mathematical ideas and concepts

JeannieA: The google site... can you get full text articles for research?

DavidWe: You don't need any particular software, just a web browser that supports Java

JulieSK: I used the math tools site for surface area

DavidWe nods

DavidWe: I'm not sure, Jeannie. I don't know that particular web site

DavidWe waves to Julie

JeannieA: I'm looking for some specific articles and not having much luck finding them at our local university site.

DavidWe: Hi, Julie. Welcome

DavidWe: Specific articles about...?

JulieC: Hi everyone.

JulieSK: Hi

DavidWe: We're discussing a range of things, Julie

SusanR: Welcome Julie

DavidWe . o O (other one, Sue)

BJB2 wonders if NCTM would have links to articles

JeannieA: Reading, strategies, struggling readers, reading-writing connections

JulieSK: NCTM does have some great links

JulieSK: Jeannie, you could go to galileo

SusanR: Jeannie, do check out the k to 3+ Resource Room for Reading Strategies

SusanR: I believe there was a session on that topic

JeannieA: Do you need membership? Do you have the web address?

BridgetM joined the room.

SusanR: why don't we head up to the K to 3+ Resource room and browse...must join first

DavidWe: Hi, Bridget. Welcome

JeannieA: Resource Room for Reading Strategies... Is that a room at Tapped In?

JulieSK: How do I explore the math resources room without logging out of this room?

BridgetM: hi - very late - sorry

SusanR: I did a few sessions on 4 Blocks
