SusanR: What happens to your brain when you're forced to choose between two different--and potentially conflicting--points of view? Learning. That's what makes the smackdown model such an effective approach to teaching, training, and most other forms of communication."

SusanR: "By presenting different perspectives or views of the topic, the learner's brain is forced into making a decision about which one they most agree with. And as long as the learner is paying attention, you won't even have to ask. In other words, it doesn't have to be a formal exercise where the learner must physically make a choice between multiple things; simply by giving their brain the conflicting message, their brain has no choice. Brains cannot simply leave the conflicts out there without at least trying to make an evaluation."
