**BiB**: don't overlook community resources and local industries

**BjB**: and always write your grant so that it appears the grant giver will get something for his bucks

AlisonMu: meaning?

**SusanAM**: What do you mean "get something'?

**BjB**: I mean that the grantor will be recognized in some way...

AlisonMu: ah

**BjB**: or get data from the use of the funds granted...the outcome of the project

**BjB**: there are excellent grant writing tips here in this room

**BjB**: the featured Grant Writing Tip on the welcome screen is also a good start

**LindaKe**: The resources you've shown us are "worth a million"--thanks

**BjB** agrees.

**TinaGst2**: How much time do you regularly spend on Tapped In?

**TinaGst2**: Wow! My job sounds like a piece of cake after that!

**BjB**: I spend a LOT of time here. I love the community, I love the people who come here, and I love the excitement of learning new ways to look at learning

**BjB**: a classroom teacher can become very isolated

**TinaGst2**: Yes, that's why it's good to take classes and stay in touch. Tapped In is a completely new resource to me.

**BjB**: taking classes isn't always an option either.

**BiB**: and when the class is finished or the inservice is over...

**BjB**: you have no one with whom to collaborate and get feedback on what works and what doesn't

**TinaGst2**: That's true. Time and money can hinder things too. Tapped In sounds like a reasonable option but don't you like to know/see who you're talking to?

**BjB**: Tina, click one time on BJB under the HERE tab and then click on the green i at the bottom

**JeffC**: We do Tina.

**JeffC**: Once you're a member... as Bj says, you may see her profile.

**TinaGst2**: It's just all so new to me.

**Jeff**C: Tina... how many sites have you ever been to where there are people there to help you learn?

**TinaGst2**: None, that's why I've been slow to use the technology that is available. This class is making me investigate and gain confidence in something that I must learn to use for the good of my students.

**JeffC**: you're in the right place then Tina.

**JeffC**: What class... where? And who is the professor?
