SusanR. o O (counting down..the topic this evening is Read Alouds)

SusanR: Let us start with brief introductions and the reason you are here tonight

AmeeM: My name is Amee and I am here to learn about Read Alouds and as a course requirement

KimNS: I am monitoring a chat for a reading specialist class. My name is Kim

TonjaC: I am here to be more informed about read alouds and we are required to attend professional training. This looked interesting to me

KellyJB: I am Kelly, and I am an English teacher at Woodward High School. I am also here tonight for a reading specialist class.

SusanR: I am a generalist in the area of education.. a K to 3 teacher for more years than I care to say

SusanR: also I am Sue R..moderator/facilitator of the K to 3+ Great Resources here at TI

SusanR: I am subbing currently in the K to 8

SusanR: so a varied group this evening

TonjaC: yes

TonjaC: I am special ed

SusanR: This is part two of the session.. I will give you the links mentioned in part one

AmeeM: great

JeannieA: I am a Title Reading teacher.

SusanR: The agenda this evening 10 minutes of informal discussion and then we will launch into some web based resources to support and extend Read Alouds in the classroom

TonjaC: sounds great

SusanR: Some of you were talking about presentations in PowerPoint earlier this evening

TonjaC: yes

AmeeM: Yes, I am becoming well versed in powerpoint :)

TonjaC: We use power point for many of the informational projects we are assigned

SusanR: You may want to look at this as an alternative

TonjaC: we have grown to like them

SusanR: a tool for making presentations online...

JeannieA: Oh, have I learned a lot about powerpoint.

KimNS: I am in the process of learning

SusanR: just look at this briefly http://zohoshow.com/login.sas

JeffC: login as demo user Susan?

TonjaC: if we go to this now can we come back to chat successfully?

SusanR: You may want to investigate it at length later

TonjaC: thanks- I will definitely do so

TonjaC: Is it a powerpoint?

SusanR: yes, Tonja..should open in another window

KellyJB: Do we need to look at it now or later?

SusanR: just for a moment..but do keep it in mind

SusanR: Jeff, this should be of interest to you

SusanR: something to explore at your leisure

SusanR: Now one with the topic at hand

KellyJB: I got it to open! Very neat. I can't wait to play around with it,.

JeannieA: That looks interesting, if it can save time.

SusanR: exactly, Kelly... I just discovered it myself

SusanR: How would you define Read Alouds?

SusanR: Or how do you use Read Alouds in your classroom setting

SusanR . o O (just a brief statement from all of you will gear the discussion to your needs)

AmeeM: Reading to the entire class in order to model fluency and draw the students interest

KimNS: I use read alouds to model fluency to my class is one way

SusanR: Read aloud times are a perfect opportunity to increase demonstrations of how good readers interact with print

JeannieA: I use read alouds to invite further discussion of a topic.

KellyJB: I use read alouds to model fluency and comprehension. I like to read and then ask critical thinking questions as I'm reading the text.

TonjaC: Yes, I too use them to model fluency

AmeeM: I also use them to lure predictions

KimNS: After read alouds, lots of things can be studied-plot, character, setting, et

SusanR: to show students how we use a wide array of strategies to deepen our understandings about the world, and to intensify the innate pleasure children find during read aloud time.

TonjaC: I think aloud as I read to model metacognitive thinking while reading

SusanR: Through intensified demonstrations and minilessons,

SusanR: readers can load up their tool belts with strategies to apply during guided and independent reading or during content area studies.

TonjaC: that sounds really good

JeannieA: It's like the first step of a scaffolding.

SusanR: So let's take a look at Carol Hurst's recommended titles for Read Alouds

TonjaC: we're ready

SusanR: Have you used any of these titles?

SusanR: http://www.carolhurst.com/profsubjects/reading/readingaloud.html

TonjaC: I have not heard of Carol Hurst

KellyJB: No.

SusanR: She's a librarian/teacher who links literature to various areas of the curriculum

TonjaC: So she has several books out?

SusanR: Unfortunately more and more sites are becoming more commercial

AmeeM: I have used When the Relatives Came and Why mosquitoes buzz in peoples ears - they are both excellent books

SusanR: She has a monthly newsletter as well http://www.carolhurst.com/

SusanR: You may want to click on the Expanded Table of Contents

SusanR: to get an overview

JeannieA: I have used Why Mosquitos Buzz.., Amelia's Road, and I forgot, but there were three.

TonjaC: I feel silly - I have never heard of these

TonjaC: These are all about read alouds???

AmeeM: They are children's books that are great Read Alouds for the classroom

TonjaC: Oh I see! I thought they were books from her- I'm titched tonight!

KellyJB: I have heard about The Giver. We don't read it at the high school level, but I've heard it's a great book. Also, Canterbury Tales is read during senior year.

SusanR: Let's move on. I would love to hear your comments on this one

TonjaC: Susan- what books have you had the most success with?

JeannieA: I love the way the table of contents breaks it down into usable areas.

SusanR: I have used Why Mosquitos Buzzed..as part of a fable unit

SusanR: Try this one..and your comments are welcome

SusanR: Carol Hurst's site is a great resource to keep on file for Read Alouds

KellyJB: I agree Jeannie. I want to look at it later in more detail!

AmeeM: What a great reference!

KellyJB: This has a wealth of information! I can spend a whole day just browsing these two websites!

SusanR: try a specific keyword search for Read Alouds at the Read Write think site

SusanR: I think you will be amazed at the resources there

AmeeM: I use marcopolo a lot

TonjaC: good site

JeannieA: That is great. I think I may have been there before. It looks familiar.

SusanR: a related area is Think Alouds..anyone familiar with these

KimNS: yes

AmeeM: Yes, they are great for the writing process

JeannieA: Yes, students do very well with them.

TonjaC: How do you guys conduct a think aloud?

SusanR: this may explain, Tonja

TonjaC: for think alouds?

TonjaC: I have done some in my class casually but I was curious about others ideas on this

AmeeM: I have used them to model the critical thinking process - they are also great to model the structure of writing

TonjaC: think aloud to model the critical thinking process- yes that is what I do mostly, and to build curiosity

AmeeM: You literally think out loud so students are able to hear how you make predictions and/or confirm them

SusanR: That's a good reference as is this one

AmeeM: I do not have very much experience in the classroom, but have used them with small groups

TonjaC: I am good at thinking aloud anyway- I guess I am a natural . I am always talking about what I am thinking about!
