JasonMM: My name is Jason, and I'm a Juvenile Probation Officer in Lake Charles, Louisiana

AliciaHe: I'm doing my student teaching for the University of Houston

SusanR: Tonight's Topic is Classroom Management and Discipline

SusanR: I wanted to introduce this Resource Room to you

SusanR: look for ideas

AmberG: great can we access these after tonight?

AliciaHe: we need them

SusanR: all related to Classroom Management

CharonG: thanks

AmberG: thanks in advance

SusanR: so let's kick our shoes off and head to the Comfy Lounge

SusanR: so you don't get distracted with all these resources here

Room: Comfy Conference

JasonMM: Awwwh...much more relaxed...this is much better

SusanR: Harry Wong is a goldmine of info

SusanR: http://teachers.net/wong/AUG06/

HeatherLM: yes everyone should definitely get that book

SusanR: We are going to look at the Responsive Classroom

SusanR: and

AdrianneG: ok

SusanR: You may want to subscribe to their newsletter. Developed by classroom teachers, the Responsive Classroom® approach emphasizes students' social as well as academic growth.

BrendaGa: I really like the idea of how to introduce the class library.

LizetH: I like the fact that the teacher slowly reveals new centers or materials to the students once they have a better classroom routine.

SusanR: the link will be in your transcript and

SusanR: in your virtual handout

\AdrianneG: ok

HeatherLM: I like the introduction to the class library

MirsaM: that's how school should be...interesting and fun

SusanR: Please comment on what you think might work for you and then we will move on to the next resource

AmberG: centers can sometimes be overwhelming

CharonG: I like how he intrigues the kids curiosity

AmberG: and that may cause discipline problems

AmberG: doing it this way helps students feel confident about the work or activities in classroom centers

AliciaHe: if the students get into routine centers are a good way of doing many things in a good time

HeatherLM: brainstorming together really works well

HeatherLM: students feel like they are contributing to the class as a whole

ElizabetRC: center can be overwhelming but with the proper routine and movement things can run smoothly.

HeatherLM: how many center rotation are y'all doing right now?

AmberG: honestly none

AliciaM: I like the introduction of materials.

MirsaM: we don't either

AdrianneG: we have 6 centers

AliciaHe: we do small group rotations

HeatherLM: really?

AmberG: my teacher still has not sent the students into the centers

AliciaM: we have 4 centers

LizetH: actually my students self choice centers

BrendaGa: I'm in 3rd grade and my class has 3 centers to rotate for 30 mins each.

SusanR: Focused centers should be a part of the school day!!

AdrianneG: they rotate to a different center each day

LauraFD: We have self choice centers once a day typically

HeatherLM: we have about six but the students only go to 2 stations a day

HuongT: I think we have 6 centers

BrendaGa: my class changes centers every 3 weeks. they have everything from math to technology to games to reading.

MirsaM: yeah I agree...they should have centers, but unfortunately they are not implemented in my classroom

AmberG: I hope I'll see more centers in my last few weeks

AliciaM: Mine rotate centers everyday for about 20 minutes.

ElizabetRC: centers give the students a chance to do some learning on their own as well as re-teach some of those who need it!!

CharonG: I don't like when some teachers think that centers are just for the lower grades like K or 1st

LizetH: In my classroom we have free stations everyday. I guess you can say we are letting them explore.

SusanR: You may need a 5 minute filler between transition times after you complete your centers

SusanR: so can I suggest this http://www.education-world.com/a_lesson/fillers/fillers017.shtml

BrendaGa: my teacher sets a timer and the kids know that when it rings they have 5 mins to clean up and rotate.

HeatherLM: after our first rotation, I have the students come back to the rug and then go to the second rotation.

HeatherLM: it's a bit more organized that way

SusanR: or just something to bring the excitement level down in your classroom or for transitions

HeatherLM: they clean up, and calm, down,

HuongT: my sbte from last semester used a bell

AmberG: They allow the small groups to transition back to whole group

SusanR: or this http://www.yahoo.com/ ...pass your mouse over the exclamation point

BrendaGa: I really like the collaborative mystery story idea.

HeatherLM: wow I like this website

AmberG: no guided reading yet

AmberG: my school has pull outs right now

HeatherLM: we started this week,

SusanR: http://www.yahoo.com/ ..pass your mouse over the !..exclamation point

LizetH: I like the idea of starting a discussion by prompting the students with a question or comment

HeatherLM: gr groups are difficult for the flow of the stations.

AmberG: they are trying to get the really low readers up a little higher to help the classroom teacher in her small groups/guided reading

ElizabetRC: I played it and it scared me and my dog!!!! I did not know it did that!!!

SusanR: a great way to get attention!!!!

HeatherLM: it's seems chaotic sometimes, because students have to be quiet

ElizabetRC: That is a good attention getter...especially the first time you use it

BrendaGa: that is so funny, I want to try that in my class.

SusanR: Now that I got your attention The NEA is an excellent resource filed with tips

AmberG: wow there is no excuse not to try new things to help in your classroom

JasonMM: Very Cool!!

CharonG: great management ideas!

AmberG: I can't believe all of this available for free

SusanR: take a look at the Behavior Control filing cabinet

HeatherLM: this is creative!

AnnWi: Amazing!

BrendaGa: I like the noise control ideas. I need that in my class right now.

HeatherLM: we do behavior barometers!

LizetH: I like the quiet system to control behavioral problems

AliciaHe: I like being very structured

HeatherLM: I've always wanted a rain stick

CharonG: yep, the rainstick attention getter is cool!

LizetH: I mean quiet points

AliciaM: I like Noise Thermometer.

SusanR: The Quiet system caught my eye, Lizet

BrendaGa: I also like the organizing groups and activities ideas.

HeatherLM: I have four ppcd students and sometimes its hard to keep them on task

LizetH: I think it would work if implemented right

SusanR: even as a seasoned teacher I do pick up many tips here

HeatherLM: then other students become off task too

BrendaGa: these are great, I am adding them to my favorites.

CharonG: my teacher uses the timer A LOT!

ElizabetRC: I think the APPROPRIATE TALK TIMES is important for the students to learn as well!!

HeatherLM: TIMERS WORK

LizetH: right now I am having trouble with getting my students attention after they are working in a exciting and learning activity

CharonG: it seems to have students on task all the time!

AmberG: I love the questioning behavior I think it makes kids responsible for their actions

CharonG: our day is more effective because almost everything is times

HeatherLM: ouchies - we have a boo book, any time a students gets hurt, or doesn't feel well they can write about it

AliciaM: I like the wait cards idea. Great when working with a small group.

SusanR: I sometimes give students the opportunity to TALK AND SHARE during formal lessons...it deals with the constant chatter problem

LauraFD: With boo boo's I have found that a tear Jar works well, they have to catch their tears! Too Funny

LizetH: I have tried a lot of things they do talk during their formal lessons but I have difficulty regaining their attention

SusanR . o O (lots of great strategies)

LizetH: I don't know if it has to do with the fact I have 17 boys and 6 girls

SusanR: try mouthing the words with no sound

LizetH: But I have tried counting to five, turning off the light, clapping my hands, raising my hand and deducting to five

AliciaM: I think I'll try that.

AmberG: they have so much energy

MirsaM: when ever kids have problems with each other they go and talk it out on their own in the corner away from everyone

SusanR: We all have to deal with multiple needs along with the energy factor

LauraFD: One that always works for me is "open shut, Open shut (with hands) give a little clap, open shut, open shut, now put them in your lap.

AliciaHe: I give points to the tables that are quiet and quick to do what I ask

MirsaM: it keeps them from coming to you and you resolving their problems

AdrianneG: Yes my teacher gives out worms and on Fridays she pulls names and they get sock day, teacher table (one student) or pulls from the prize bucket

AmberG: my kids have to hop to the finish line and if they make it they get to participate in fun Friday activities

CharonG: my teacher gives tickets and at the end of the day they place their tickets in the raffle basket

HeatherLM: our school does student of the week, and every class grade level chooses one student, and then a table of them sit on the stage during Wednesday lunch and eat with the principals....

BrendaGa: my teacher gives little stickers. After 10 stickers they get 30 mins of free computer time

ElizabetRC: thanks Susan for that reward list

LauraFD: I love these rewards!

AmberG: these are great just be careful guys

AliciaM: I love them!!

MirsaM: these are great ideas

ElizabetRC: sometimes it's hard to know what is appropriate

AmberG: some kids can get really mad if they are not the one to get the prize

LizetH: I like the one with the lunch with the teacher. I like this one because it will also give you a chance to get to know your student better.

CharonG: I have to share a cool strategy that my teacher taught me

CharonG: one of her managers is line manager

LauraFD: We do lots of music, the kids would love to turn on the CD player as a reward

MirsaM: they always want to tell you everything and what better time then lunch time

HeatherLM: we use music all the time, especially to get their "wiggles" out

CharonG: this manager makes sure that students are in line up position (meaning quiet, walking straight and steady, hands behind back

ElizabetRC: lunch time with the teacher!! all the students want to do this one

LizetH: The kids also get excited because they are eating with the teacher.

LauraFD: That is actually a problem for me how do you continue with class without hurting the chatty one's feelings?

AmberG: me too there is this great song about wiggle in you seat

AmberG: it keeps kids in their own area

HeatherLM: a cute idea may be to have the student teach something and the teacher sit in the whole group for a bit

AmberG: but still allows them to move and get their jumps out

HeatherLM: if the teacher starts talking out, ask the class after, and the student teaching, how does that make you feel?

CharonG: I think it's excellent because you get to know your students on a more personal level when you eat in a relaxed environment

LizetH: The idea of using the computer is great.

AdrianneG: There are some good ideas floating

HeatherLM: "lets show everyone mutual respect. and attentive listening"

SusanR: I am enjoying the collaboration here!

LauraFD: one of my students just loves to interrupt the class to tell what she and her family did together, how should I respond to that?

SusanR: getting to know students on an individual basis is invaluable I have found

LauraFD: I hate to just continue with the lesson but time goes by so quickly

CharonG: maybe you should set a small amount of time for "sharing"

SusanR: Sharing Time

AmberG: Laura try allotting some "sharing" time where students can talk about whatever they want

ElizabetRC: Laura, have a story telling box where the students can write their stories down and put them in a box for you to read later

AliciaHe: I would like to have circle time but there is just no time

HeatherLM: we do things in the morning called tribes where we go over our class agreements, mutual respect: show respect for yourself, others, and things, attentive listening: listen with your eyes ears, and your hearts"

AmberG: try mail boxes for the whole class

MirsaM: they love telling me about what they did the night before

BrendaGa: at least 2 a week my teacher does individual interviews with the kids to see how they are doing. It's great.

AmberG: or a mail system

LauraFD: thank you Charon, I could do that during our morning circle/ calendar time

HeatherLM: participation, children should always have the right to pass,

AdrianneG: yes each student has a mailbox where graded papers go and messages

AmberG: that can double as a reward for those students who are behaving

LizetH: I allow students to share our morning routine. The students get a chance to share something they did or happen to them.

CharonG: yes, it worked very well when I had pre-k

CharonG: even now in 3rd grade, they love sharing

AliciaM: I always let the students share the last five minutes of class.

AmberG: well these mailboxes are more for notes and prizes

BrendaGa: true, my 3rd graders are always sharing, even when it's not time to.

AmberG: it fun seeing the kids send things to each other and the teacher

LauraFD: Yes once one little one starts talking they allllll want to share it is too funny

HeatherLM: I created a post office in second grade for letter communication about things we are learning here's the website

LizetH: As teachers we need to make sure we are meeting both the students academic and social needs.

ElizabetRC: I agree with "The number one problem in education is not discipline. It is the lack of procedures and routines"

AliciaM: always be consistent.

MirsaM: The number of people in a group must equal the number of jobs in a group.<<this one is great because you never want a student to feel like they can't do something

CharonG: structure is key!

BrendaGa: I agree with this quote: "The three characteristics of an effective teacher: 1) has good classroom management skills, 2) teaches for mastery, and 3) has positive expectations for student success."

LauraFD: This is a great list of major concepts from Harry Wong

BrendaGa: another great one is: "What you do on the first day of school will determine your success for the rest of the year." that is sooo true.
