TristanSD: I'm a baby teacher, too! Just finished grad school in July

LindsayAS: I can't believe I am done!

TristanSD: I didn't major in technology (obviously)

TristanSD: LOL

TristanSD: Good job, Lindsay!

LindsayAS: You too Tristan!

SusanR: I am a sub in Ontario, Canada! Tomorrow I teach kindergarten...the babies

TristanSD: awwww

DavidWe smiles

TristanSD: I'm Canadian...my whole family's from Canada

SusanR: I moderate and facilitate the K to 3+ Great Resources sessions

LindsayAS: I have 2 kinders... They are pretty fun

SusanR: here at TI

SusanR: they are naughty babies

SusanR: 4 year olds

TristanSD: cute

SusanR: where are they from Tristan

TristanSD: Ontario, Quebec, Victoria

TristanSD: all over!

SusanR: what are you doing down in California,

LindsayAS: K- we intro'd what next?

LindsayAS trying that ol problem solving...

DavidWe: Back to Linda's web site...maybe...?

LindaU: okay.. Do I need to post it again (with BJ's help)

LindaU: Thanks...

LindsayAS: go bj you are on it!

TristanSD: My mom's side of the fam is here...my dad's side is there

SusanR: I see

LindaU: I'm working with two teachers a World Studies (10th grade SS/Lang Arts) who are doing this with their students.

LindaU: Students compete on a topic related to the annual theme. This year the theme is the global market place.

LindsayAS: It really looks intriguing. so the kids are in upper high school?

LindaU: They pick a topic-- prepare a presentation that identifies a problem/issue, and propose a viable solution. They are judged by folks from the community (politicians, NGO folks, etc.)

LindaU: It seems pretty powerful.

LindaU: They have a middle school and a high school competition.

DavidWe: very cool looking project

LindaU: The students in the World Studies class are connecting this to their curriculum (the content standards for Lang Arts and Social Studies)

LindsayAS: Sounds really neat. I don't know if my kids would do something like that but I may look into adapting it for us to do locally

LindaU: So they are looking for links for their topics to imperialism, the world wars, the cold war and various revolutions.

LindaU: The neat thing, in my mind, is they are connecting social studies to their own lives, then back out to the global context (over time).

TristanSD: this is a little much for elementary, but what a GREAT way to get students involved

LindaU: I think it could be modified for elementary students.

TristanSD: social studies is typically pretty boring in middle and high school (at least in my experiences) and this looks so engaging

TristanSD: I would like to see how it could be modified

LindaU: It's boring when it is taught by memorizing dates and names, etc..

LindsayAS: My kids are all below grade level.. but perhaps modifying it would help... I don't know inspire them with real world connections

TristanSD: exactly

DavidWe: You need to come to one of the Social Studies Forum, Tristan

TristanSD: that's how I was taught

TristanSD: ok

TristanSD smiles

DavidWe: Michael Hutchison is a SUPERB social studies teacher

LindaU: I think it could be modified for grades 3-6--or maybe 4-6.

LindsayAS: hmmm... can I come too? or is just Tristan special?

TristanSD: history can be so amazing if students can actually relate to it and do hands-on activities

LindsayAS thinking.. I wanted to be a history teacher.. elementary school works because I get to do both.

SusanR: primary students need to role play history to truly understand it

SusanR: or to get a bit of a grasp

TristanSD: exactly

TristanSD: we're learning about the American Indians of long ago and how they relate to those living today

SusanR: I know the grade 4's immerse themselves into the Middle Ages

TristanSD: I haven't tried role playing yet, but that's a great idea!

LindaU: Your kids wear clothing manufactured in emerging nations. They play video games manufactured and created off-shore, etc.

SusanR: in every aspect..the classroom becomes a castle etc

TristanSD: wow...nice

LindaU: They may have parents who lost their jobs because the jobs are now done cheaper by people in other countries..

SusanR listens

LindaU: They may be looking for cheaper tech. gadgets.. (iPods, video games, etc...)... so this can be tied directly back to what the are interested in..

TristanSD: true

LindaU: Tristan.. just make sure the hands-on activities have clear learning objectives.

LindsayAS: Hey guys.. sorry I have to scoot. It is dinner time and I have screaming kiddos.

TristanSD: yes...

LindsayAS waves bye!

BJB2: thanks for your contributions to the discussion, Lindsay

LindaU actually misses dinner time with screaming kiddos.

LindsayAS: its so much fun.. my 3 year old is beating up the 1 year old.

LindsayAS: Talk to you later

LindaU remembers those days

LindsayAS left the room (signed off).

TristanSD: we just finished a project on four different California Indian groups...each group had one Indian group and they presented a poster with diff. aspects of their lifestyle (music, food, houses, art, etc.)

LindaU: Did you tie this back to the status of these tribes today?

TristanSD: we haven't yet...that's the next chapter...

LindaU: Are there local native Californians who can come and talk to your students?

TristanSD: hmmm...

TristanSD: I could look into it

TristanSD: that's a really good idea

TristanSD: we are also going to see if we can borrow some things from a local museum

LindaU: When I was still teaching elementary school we had some of the tribal elders from Native Mweukma Ohlone come to the classroom.

TristanSD: nice!

TristanSD: that would be so fun for them

LindaU: We also went to observe a dig led by an archaeologist at SJSU who was working with the tribe as they dug up the remains of their ancestors and reburied them (secret burial) as a highway was being built.

DavidWe: Lindsay, you were here last Thursday, right, for the American Indian Studies discussion, right?

LindaU: I took my son, who is now an archaeologist.

TristanSD: I think your ideas are great, Linda!

LindaU: Anyway.. back to PBL.. The interesting thing about having the tribal elders work with my students is they were not a recognized tribe.

TristanSD: we need to get students excited about history

LindaU: My students wrote letters to their Congress persons on the tribe's behalf to help them get tribal status.

DavidWe agrees with Tristan

LindaU: History isn't just about long-dead guys and dates, but it relates to everything happening in the world today..

TristanSD: wow...you put me to shame!

TristanSD: so true

LindaU: ...and directly affects the lives of our students, now and in the future...

TristanSD: I wish I had had teachers like you to get me more interested in history

TristanSD: it always seemed dull to me

LindaU: I'm pretty passionate about this...

TristanSD: and I had to try to create my own interest in it

LindaU: I started out to be a social studies teacher MANY years ago.. but got diverted..

DavidWe smiles

LindaU: I found history boring in high school until my senior year.. when I had an outstanding teachers (with whom I still correspond.)

TristanSD: awww...

LindaU: He's well up in his 80s now, but still sharp and keeps me thinking after all these years.

LindaU: The secret is to help your students find the ties between social studies and the things they care about. It's not all that hard.

TristanSD: true

LindaU: Actually this is true for all subjects..

TristanSD: we keep discussing social studies and our community and how it relates to the Indian communities we're studying

TristanSD: they are very engaged

LindaU: good..

SusanR listens

LindaU: Native CA history is fascinating.

SusanR: Canadian...aboriginal, Inuit and native history is quite fascinating

BJB2: Thanks for leading this discussion for us, Linda! I'm sorry Chris didn't show up.

DavidWe: Yes, thanks, Linda

LindaU: Not sure I really led it.. but I had fun..

DavidWe hopes Tristan can make it back for another discussion

TristanSD: Tristan listens

TristanSD smiles

SusanR: Thanks Linda and a pleasure meeting you, Tristan

TristanSD: Nice to meet you guys!!!!

TristanSD: Linda, I'm impressed!

DavidWe: Linda IS impressive, Tristan

TristanSD: I know...wow!

TristanSD: you've inspired me...
