DavidWe: I'm David Weksler. I'm a HelpDeesk volunteer and I lead a math education and technology discussion here. I'm in New Jersey, close to New York City

SusanR: The topic for this evening is Online Collaborative Projects

SusanR: with a special guest...Jen Wagner who should be arriving shortly

SusanR: How would you define online collaborative projects?

BjB: Tapped In!

DavidWe agrees with Bj

SusanR: of course, Bj

SusanR: Online collaborative projects are one way in which teachers and students can expand their views of themselves in relation to the other places around the world.

NormalM: working with a partner using technology to complete a assigned work or project.

AraceliGo: A way for people to get together via internet and websites and work on a single project

JoseMH: A virtual classroom participation.

SusanR: Online collaborative projects are designed to integrate internet technology into any subject area and offer a way to connect your classroom to other students, experts, and communities around the world.

SusanR: Can anyone share their participation in an online project?

JeffC: Sure...

SusanR: or knowledge of

JeffC: read the first few paragraphs on http://snurl.com/netc1

MaryHan: My students were delighted to share a project with friends in China last year, and this year they are looking forward to working on a collaborative project with many others. We created a photostory comparing a day in the life of a student in Texas and China.

AraceliGo: wow

JeffC: That sounds like an excellent project Mary.

NormalM: could participation on an online course such as chatting be considered online project participation?

SusanR: I would think so, Norma

NormalM: oh ok because that would be one of my participations in an online project.

SusanR: so to start simply I like the earth day project..

MaryHan: Was that thru Tapped In?

SusanR: easy to implement and it does have a small online component

SusanR: ok David..take the floor

DavidWe: EarthDay reminded me....The Noonday project - my friend Ihor Charischak runs this

DavidWe: Collaborative project to measure the circumference of the Earth - around the Spring and Fall Equinoxes

DavidWe: That's all

DavidWe: Pretty self-explanatory, but it is important that data is collected in different places around the world

NormalM: sounds like a very interesting collaborative project.

AraceliGo: that sounds interesting I'll have to check it out

MaryHan: thanks for the idea

DavidWe: wonderful project -simple geometry allows for accurate measurement of the

earth

DavidWe . o O (upper middle school/high school project, I would say)

SusanR: that's a good one..and now for the younger ones

DavidWe: Thanks, Susan

JeffC: The link I popped up earlier was for the Newsday Project at Global School House... my students were published internationally in over two dozen student newspapers.

SusanR: the earth day grocery project http://www.earthdaybags.org/

SusanR: this can be implemented school-wide

SusanR: it started in 1994 would you believe

SusanR: take a look and see if it works for you

MarjorieSh: it sounds good to me from what I saw

MaryHan: looks like fun!

NormalM: yes it looks lot a lot of fun

AraceliGo: it looks like a great project

SusanR: and these are standard and grade related http://www.k12science.org/collabprojs.html

DavidWe . o O (where my friend Ihor works (<u>www.k12science.org</u>))

AraceliGo: great resource, thanks

AraceliGo: lots of interesting projects here

NormalM: thank you those resources will sure come in handy

JenW joined the room.

DavidWe waves to Jen

DavidWe: Hi, Jen. Welcome

JenW: hi

JoseMH: Great student participation opportunity.

SusanR: Oh Hi Jen

NormalM: welcome Jen

SusanR hugs Jen

SusanR: Let me introduce Jen

SusanR: Jen is a k-6 tech teacher who has pioneered many on-line global projects for students and teachers. She is a frequent presenter at such conferences as NECC, CUE etc. and a 2006 Global Schoolnet award winner. She is a WOW2 individual, one of 4 women who not only love using the tools of the Internet but also love sharing the tools with others.

JenW: I much more like helping teachers rather than teaching the kids

JenW smiles

JenW: Anyway -- Sue wanted me to come tell you about some projects

JenW: I am putting together between now and May

SusanR: which is more of a challenge

JenW: I wanted to invite you (if you can) to participate in a project happening THIS

WEEK

JenW: I know it is late notice -- but I can sneak you in if you wish to join

SusanR listens intently

NormalM: what is the project about?

JenW: but feel free to grab the worksheets

JenW: and we have 870 teachers/classrooms involved

JenW: we are using Google Earth to map where people live

JenW: and a Bulletin board to share ideas

AraceliGo: oooh my class is on spring break

JenW: You are welcome to visit both the bulletin board and also our google map by

visiting

NormalM: yes my is too

MaryHan: My school is on spring break, but I hope to join the Egg project

SusanR: we are on Spring Break as well

JenW: Well -- grab the worksheets and use them later -- if you wish

JenW: AHHH ____ the Egg Roll

JenW: You do have time to join that

JenW: any questions though about Lucky Chamrs?

NormalM: I sure will grab one of the worksheets

JenW: please do -- they disappear on Saturday

JenW: poof -- gone

JenW: Okay -- onward to the next project

SusanR hopes it will be repeated next year

JenW: The Great Egg Roll is in its SEVENTH YEAR

JenW: you -- and your students roll eggs (plastic eggs)

JenW: and record the rolls and create ONE Average

NormalM: well I am currently student teaching pre-k

JenW: and it is PreK - 6

JenW: so you will be creating 3 averages

AraceliGo: any grade level

JenW: 1 for you -- 1 for them -- and 1 FINAL TOTAL TALLY

JenW: Any grade

JenW: or anybody

JenW: One school has asked the local firestation to roll with them

JenW: and they said YES

SusanR . o O (wonderful to catch the excitement of Easter)

JenW: In fact, a different grade will really help to explain how averages work

JenW: and how they can benefit you --

JenW: LOL -- especially if you are a horrid roller like me

JenW: Registration for this starts on Monday

JenW: I hope for 1,000 rollers -- but we shall see

JenW: And be sure to check out the Egg Fashion Show -- it is a keeper

SusanR: How many did you have last year, Jen?

JenW: let me check

JenW: 3,450 rollers -- I meant to say I hope for 1,000 classes (not rollers)

SusanR: WOW

AraceliGo: It sounds very cool!

NormalM: wow that was a lot of rollers

JenW: our average last year was 241 inches

JoseMH: That must be fun for the kids involved.

JenW: anyway --

JenW: Norma -- whatever you wish

JenW: we have had K

JenW: we have had 6th

JenW: hang on -- just a sec

JoseMH: Kids seem to enjoy sending cards/letters to our soldiers.

JenW: 27,012 -- cards sent in 2005

JenW: yes, they do

JenW: we just finished a project where they sent to hospitals and rest homes

JenW: and the thanks was AWESOME for the kids

JenW: it really touched a lot of lives

JoseMH: My wife's 6th graders sent letters to a missionary family recently and they enjoyed it very much.

JenW: that was the FROM ME TO YOU PROJECT

JenW: which happens the week of Valentine's Day

JenW: Yes Jose -- that is great

AraceliGo: All these projects seem really great

NormalM: so far all the projects sound both fun and educational

JenW: anyway -- I know I chatted fast

JenW: OH -- and all have standards

MarjorieSh: yeah really great ideas

JenW: well -- not the Dear Soldier

JenW: but all the rest do

NormalM: yes and that is the best part of the projects that they have standards

MarjorieSh: but you can figure out what standards to use... it's writing... you could work on so many skills with that

JenW: yes

JenW: plus -- it is an Idea Project now

JoseMH: true

JenW: pretty much running its own

NormalM: yes it is

MaryHan: Thanks for all your work and great ideas

JenW: I am not doing anything but providing the idea

NormalM: thank you so much I will look into those projects

JenW: anyway -- that is what Susan wanted me to share with you!!

MarjorieSh: I'm printing off a million things here LOL

JenW: ahhh -- http://www.technospud.com

JenW: that will give you my blog, my book, and my newsletter

JenW: http://www.technospudprojects.com will give you my projects

SusanR: not to be missed

CamilleL: I know -- I've visited her site -- she's wonderful!

JenW: LOL--- thanks -- right now I am tired

MaryHan: I am looking forward to hearing you at NECC in Atlanta. By

JenW: over 120 results of Lucky charms came in today

JenW: Be sure to say hi Mary

SusanR: Camille is a Literacy Coach, am I correct?

MaryHan: ok

CamilleL: Yes in a non public school.

CamilleL: I finally got the teachers to consider doing it, but they are still soooo very hesitant. Any suggestions?

DavidWe: hesitant about...?

CamilleL: oh, I meant about grouping

SusanR: why are they hesitant?

MarjorieSh: set in their ways??

CamilleL: this is a parochial school with 33 kiddies in the class...

SusanR: how are they grouped
