SusanR: The theme tonight is Back to School: challenges, excitement and jitters of being back in the classroom

SusanR: to start a fresh new year

SusanR: Let's start with brief intros

BJB2: I teach communication in Pennsylvania

SusanR: where are you from and what brings you here and what you hope to get out of this session

BJB2: new year jitters are something even experienced teachers get

SusanR: I am a substitute teacher, tutor and wanna be background extra in movies

CamilleL: I have a literacy and an ed technology background and I hope to find something in one or both of these areas for the new school year.

SusanR: from Ottawa, Ontario Canada where a number of movies have been shot around town

CamilleL: I come from the Bronx, New York.

SonyaAndrV: Hi, I am from Texas and am studying to be elementary teacher.

SusanR: I always get the jitters at the start of a school year.

CamilleL: Elementary kiddies are my favorite.

CamilleL: I tell you to me teaching is a career, not just a job. I'm glad I'm in this profession.

CamilleL: The kiddies keep me young too!

SusanR: Once a teacher; always a teacher. There is something magnetic about teaching

CamilleL: I just love working with these little ones, and watching them get things for the first time -- truly awesome those ah ha moments, eh?

SusanR: WE ARE SEASONED TEACHERS, VICTORIA!!

CamilleL: A little pat on the back for all us, please.

BJB2: Pats Camille and Sue on the back :-)

SusanR claps

CamilleL: aw, thank you so much, BJ

CamilleL: and you, Sue.

BJB2: so, how are you going to help us get over those jitters, Sue?

CamilleL: try one way, and then try another, until they get it, or have another kiddie explain it.

SusanR: If you are new to teaching you may want to peruse this script for the 1st day

CamilleL: I'm not so sure I'm comfortable with the term script. Although for a new teacher, having this to fall back on should help. But, I would advise not to depend on it and to get ready to improvise.

BJB2. o O (plan B is always a good idea)

SusanR : exactly, Camille

CamilleL: and that goes for the duration of the year, not just the first day.

CamilleL: our kiddies come in hungry, angry, confused, etc. and we need to address their personal needs as well.

SusanR: I have some key points that I gleaned from the discussion area in the K to 3 Resource Room

SusanR: 1. Get everything done in your personal life NOW. Make sure everything is current, extra meals are frozen, that closet you always wanted cleaned-do it now or forget about it. The first months of actually teaching will be exhausting. Be prepared.

SusanR: 2. Try to get in your classroom as soon as possible to set things up and to use this as an opportunity to get to know the staff. Once school begins, everyone is so busy. Make the contacts now, it will help you out incredibly later.

VictoriaNG: right

CamilleL: I think if you can relax more, and try not to be so worried, then you won't be so exhausted.

SusanR: I usually spend a week or two setting up

CamilleL: you mean, setting up your materials?

CamilleL: I think that's what we call our "toolbox"

SonyaAndrV: I would imagine the classroom

SusanR: decorating, looking at texts, preparing materials,

SonyaAndrV: yupp

CamilleL: unless of course you're an out of the classroom type teacher -- you do not have a classroom to set up.
