PamelaEC: My name is Pamela and I attend the University of Houston. I am currently doing my student teaching in a Kindergarten classroom.

CrystalMK: Hi I'm Crystal, I am a student teacher at the University of Houston.. I am in a 3rd grade classroom

SusanR: I am an Occasional Teacher and will be subbing next week in Kindergarten

SusanR: Any concerns or issues re classroom

SusanR: September is always an anxious month for new and seasoned teachers

SusanR: alike

CamilleL: I received poor quality summaries from my students when asked to respond to their personal literature -- how do we improve their summarizations?

JeffC: I'm on Helpdesk here, also have two kids in 2nd and 4th grade... will be forwarding this transcript to their teachers.

DavidW . o O (re-write them?)

SusanR: oh my gosh, Jeff

CamilleL: no, not just that David -- how could they improve their responses?

PamelaEC: Well I am now starting to see the educational gap between the Kindergarten students, how do you help those in need while continuing to help the more advanced students?

CamilleL: grouping and circulation around the room

SusanR: would anyone else care to respond

CrystalMK: The educational gap, is also big between the 3rd grade students

SusanR: should most activities be open ended

CamilleL: I believe the catch phrase here is "differentiated instruction"

SusanR: yes, that's it Camille

SusanR: collaborative activities should help

CamilleL: not easy to do, but once you've got a schedule, and model how you want the

activities set up, the kiddies will naturally follow your directives automatically.

PamelaEC: The teachers are starting to group the students for a reading program to help all the students' needs, so maybe that will be useful

CamilleL: absolutely, Pam!

PamelaEC: Well it's in the process, so I can't wait to see the results

CamilleL: You will be doing a "guided reading" with one group while the others have a schedule of activities, and then you rotate and see other kiddies personally.

CrystalMK: That is what I see as well in the classroom, and it's working great

CamilleL: I think the Reading First people call this the Reading Workshop.

PamelaEC: Yes! That's exactly what they will be doing.

CamilleL: And you set up different levels of activities at various centers around the room.

PamelaEC: That's correct, I attended our first meeting today about it and that's exactly what they will be doing.

CamilleL: These are called "Work Stations."

CrystalMK: Yes, like listening centers, reading counts, readers theater etc..

CamilleL: that's it, crystal!

CamilleL: the kiddies need to learn to be independent, and they love to make you proud that they could take on these responsibilities without you.

CrystalMK: I see that, but it still takes a lot of practice and rules for them to be independent even in 3rd grade

CamilleL: you also need to set up "experts" that the kiddies could come to while you are doing your guided reading so they do not disturb you.

CrystalMK: So they stay on task, and they know what's expected

SusanR: It will come with routine practice. By November your students should be on track

CamilleL: You practice the first month with a chart of activities and their names so they know where to go and when.

PamelaEC: That's true. I didn't think of that before, but we do have some students that can help the others instead of them asking you questions while you are busy

CamilleL: this is so good for their language improvement, and of course, self esteem, and also team spirit.

SusanR: Have students grouped into task managers etc

CrystalMK: Team work takes practice as well, because many of them want to be the boss.

CamilleL: the burden of responsibility should not only be on you. you would be cheating your students out on some growth opportunities.

SusanR: put the onus on students..you will be amazed

CamilleL: you have got to model what it looks like and sounds like to cooperate.

CrystalMK: task managers is a great idea

SusanR: even in kindergarten

SusanR: they should be responsible for their own learning

CrystalMK: agree

PamelaEC: So make them responsible for jobs inside the class, so far I find it hard because a lot of them are still immature

CamilleL: Pam, you've got to do a bit more complimenting, and making a big deal out of their little success -- that works wonders!

SusanR: exactly

CamilleL: once they see and hear you complimenting others, they want to be complimented too.

SusanR: I have had students re-teach concepts or a particular skill

SusanR: amazing how attentive students are when their peers have command of the class

PamelaEC: Oh yes, I do that too. It does work wonders!

CamilleL: I love when they talk about the new things they are "into" -- I research these on the net and share in their enthusiasm.

SusanR: moving on to some great resources to support this discussion

SusanR: feel free to jump in at any time to share

PamelaEC: Thank you. I will definitely look for it.

CamilleL: very welcome. you will enjoy it.

SusanR: Could we possibly find some books in the virtual library here

SusanR: students could do their own search and reporting

SusanR: one can search only for picture books

PamelaEC: Sounds great! Do you have to join the library to search the site?

SusanR: well let's investigate

CamilleL: no, I just searched free.

BiB . o O (Pam leads Web Tools for Education)

SusanR: we could spend the evening on this site alone

PamelaEC: I know it looks like a great resource

SusanR: Here is the simple search category

PamelaEC: Or even outside of holidays, maybe a culture week

CamilleL: I love it -- especially the food
