BiB: we usually start all the discussions with introductions.

SandraS: Welcome, Elizabeth!

SandraS apologizes to BJ for interrupting...

BjB: please tell Sandy where you are located, what you teach, and what you hope to get

from the discussion

BjB: no apologies necessary, Sandy

MaureenB joined the room.

ElizabetAC: So just anybody start?

SandraS: go for it, Elizabeth

FredK: I tutor for the Push County Literacy Council in SE Oklahoma

SandraS waves to Maureen

JeffC: Jeff Cooper, in Oregon, on Helpdesk here and along for the virtual ride as usual...

enjoying my free edumacation here.

BjB: I'm an art teacher in Pennsylvania and am interested in introducing more writing into my curriculum

LisaC joined the room.

SharonTr: I live in sunny San Diego. I teach K-8 for a virtual academy (homeschooling) and I always need help/tips for writing

MaureenB waves back

ElizabetAC: K...I'm in Las Vegas, I'm don't teach at this point, and I'm here to get responses to my writing

HeatherBu: I'm a middle school Technology teacher in Texas, and I would like to incorporate more writing in my classes.

SandraS waves to Lisa

BjB: hi, Lisa and Maureen. We're just starting introductions

BjB: a reminder that if you are new to Tapped In, go to ACTIONS in the top right of your screen and click on DETACH

MaureenB: Hi all I teach 4th grade in Putnam Valley, NY

SandraS: college lit. and writing in Huntsville AL

FredK: Elizabeth, I grew up in Boulder City

SandraS: is that everybody?

ElizabetAC: Fred..I'm pretty new here..I'm a San Diego native

CathleenCW joined the room.

HeatherBu: Hi, Cathy. We're just starting with introductions

SandraS: Hi, Cathleen.

CathleenCW: Hello

FredK: Elizabeth, talk with you later.

HeatherBu: Please say where you are from, and what you teach

LisaC: Hi 7th and 8th grade English, Louisiana

SandraS: We have a wonderful group here!

CathleenCW: HS English, Tarkington, Texas

SandraS: I usually describe the National Writing Project for about 5 minutes and then we

get to it.

SandraS: So here's my spiel National Writing Project is a professional development

group

SandraS: that's been around for about 30 years

SandraS: 3 main tenets are that teachers are the best teachers of other teachers

SandraS: (no canned or packaged inservice)

SandraS: that teachers who improve their own writing are more effective teachers of

writing

SandraS: that writing can be used to learn across all subject matters

SandraS: the NWP has about 190 sites housed at colleges

SandraS: serving mostly k-12 teachers

SandraS: great university-k12 collaborations

SandraS: main program is the summer institute

SandraS: which is a great experience

SandraS: you can see if there's a writing project site near you by checking out the map

on the website

SandraS: let's take a look at the website for a couple seconds, then come back here

SandraS: http://writingproject.org

ElizabetAC: I tried to click on the link and nothing happened

SandraS: did that link work?

SandraS: yeah, hang on

SandraS: http://www.writingproject.org

SandraS: hm..still not working

BjB: worked for me

ElizabetAC: not for me...sorry

HeatherBu: I've got it

BiB: make sure you don't have a minimized window

SandraS: I'm using Firefox

BjB: and you hold down the ctrl key on your keyboard

BjB . o O (to override pop ups)

MaureenB: I got it and one of the sites is at my daughter's college

SandraS: great, Maureen

SandraS: if you can't reach the site, you'll have a transcript with the URL to check it out

later

SharonTr: so, if you're near a site, you can attend workshops they put on?

SandraS: yes, that is...

SandraS: you need to attend a Summer Institute first

FredK: Worked for me; I'm loading the map.

MichelleHe: Do you just check the web site to see when they are held?

SandraS: then you are an official Teacher Consultant

SandraS: and you can participate in any NWP activity...like writing retreats

SandraS: Michelle, you need to go to a Summer Institute first...

MichelleHe: Thanks

SharonTr: how do you find out about the summer institutes?

SandraS: some activities are inservices with teachers who have not been to an Summer

Institute

ElizabetAC: got it

SandraS: Sharon, you can click on the link to the writing project site near you, and they should have information on summer institute

SandraS: each Writing Project site has a summer institute

SandraS: many of them offer college credit

SandraS: others give stipends

SandraS: each site does things differently to take advantage of their particular circumstances

SandraS: any other questions about NWP before we go on?

SandraS: NWP is federally funded with a 30 million dollar budget...every year NWP lobbies to get that budget renewed

SandraS: ok, this is what I'd like to do this evening

SandraS: the NWP website has tons of resources and we're going to check one of them out tonight

BjB: a reminder that all urls will be in the transcript that is sent to you when you log out

SandraS: there's a small publication called "30 Ideas for Teaching Writing"

SandraS: you can order it online

SandraS: but it's also in PDF version

SandraS: there's a link to each section of the pamphlet...

SandraS: so I'm going to give you the URL

SandraS: when you go there, you can look at the table of contents of the pamphlet

SandraS: each of the 30 ideas takes about 2 paragraphs to describe

SandraS: at the bottom of the description, there's a link to The Quarterly article the idea comes from

SandraS: The Quarterly is the journal produced by NWP

SandraS: right now it's making the transition from print to online

SandraS: but all the print versions are available online

SandraS: what I'd like each of you to do is to pick one of the 30 ideas...just click on the one from the table of contents that interests you... read the 2 paragraphs...and come back here

SandraS: and talk about what you learned, what you thought about the idea

SandraS: How does that sound?

CathleenCW: Great!

BjB: sounds good

MaureenB: I'm ready

SharonTr: =)

SandraS: what an intrepid group of explorers!

SandraS: I've got 8.20 central time, Sprint time

SandraS: so let's just say we'll convene back here in 5 minutes and start our discussion

HeatherBu nods

SandraS: here's the URL

SandraS: http://www.writingproject.org/cs/nwpp/print/nwpr/922

SandraS: if you have any problems, just yell!

SharonTr: oh, I'm having trouble linking

SusanR joined the room.

SharonTr: what were the shortcuts from before?

MichelleHe: me too

SandraS: hold down control key

SandraS: then click on URL

SharonTr: not working, tried that

SandraS: ok, hang on...

SharonTr: that's weird b/c I didn't have trouble with nwp

SandraS: can you get back to the NWP site?

SharonTr: yes, still have that window open

SandraS: if you can get back there, look at top menu and click on Publications

SharonTr: okay

SandraS: then click on Other Publications

SandraS: should be first item

SharonTr: ok

SandraS: Sorry ... third item

SharonTr: awesome, got it! thanks

SandraS: Yeah!!!

SandraS: ok, it's 8.25 central time...anyone ready to share what s/he read?

BjB nods

MaureenB: hint 4Help student writers draw rich chunks of writing from endless sprawl.

BjB: I read the same one, Maureen!

MaureenB: this is always the hardest things for my students to do is focus

SandraS: Oh, cool!

BjB listens to Maureen's comments

SharonTr: =)

MaureenB: I like the idea of a cartoon box

HeatherBu: I like # 16..encourage descriptive writing by focusing on the sounds of words...Words should "taste good"

SandraS: cool, heather

AndreaDN: I liked that one too.

SandraS: let's take #4 for a bit...

SandraS: BJ read that one too

SandraS: What drew you and Maureen to the sprawl one?

SharonTr: I read about using individuals' home language to learn standard English

SusanR: #5 appeals to me .. Work with words relevant to students' lives to help them build vocabulary.

SandraS: great, Sharon

SandraS waves to Susan

BjB: I also have trouble with students focusing on one topic

MaureenB: my students always tend to write sprawl stories in the beginning of the year

BjB: I liked the visual aid of a frame to focus

SandraS: I agree, BJ

MaureenB: I like the frame too

FredK: #11 gives an interesting approach

SandraS: hint #4 is a great example of using visual to help focus writing

SandraS listens to Fred

SusanR: I like the students to play with words

AndreaDN: I like the idea of the frame to keep them focused, but I worry sometimes that it limits creativity.

SharonTr: I had trouble choosing one of the 30 b/c they all sound good~

SandraS agrees with Sharon

FredK: #11 uses the students gab to form headlines for the days writing project

CathleenCW: I chose #3 because I believe students are quite involved with relationships at the HS level and writing about something they understand/live with encourages writing.

SandraS: well, the really cool thing with the publication is you can go right to the longer article and read more

SandraS: I like that one, too, Fred

SandraS: cool, Cathleen

SandraS: ok the creativity concern about frames...what about the comic book programs that are out there?

SandraS: there's one only for macs that is great

SharonTr: to get the article, you click on the link below the description?

SandraS: right, Sharon

SharonTr: wow, what a super resource!

SandraS: http://www.comiclife.com

MaureenB: the other thing is that if they frame the story they may end of with tons of story ideas

SandraS: I think that's the right url for Macs

AndreaDN: Never heard of the comic book programs, thanks for the link

SandraS: there's another one...hang on

AndreaDN: I teach at a school that follows the Noyce Foundation for writing.

SusanR: excellent articles/resources to support the topic in #4 "Visualizing Vocabulary

SandraS: http://www.pimpampum.net/bubblr/

SandraS: these are lots of fun

CathleenCW: I have used the term 'freeze frame the moment' so the students will be guided into going into detail and

SandraS: and they help the writer to cut the words down to what's necessary

CathleenCW: show not tell...

AndreaDN: thanks, I'll check those out.

SandraS: oh, that's a great idea Cathleen

SandraS: Fred, can you explain the one you read?

FredK: =ok

FredK: The teacher listens to the student talk and then puts a headline on the blackboard for the students to write about.

FredK: The students are familiar, so the writing is easier

SandraS: right...so 5th grade students come in Monday gabbing about their weekend

CathleenCW: I also think that would be a great kick-off for poetry.

FredK: right

SandraS: they post personal headlines to bulletin board

SandraS: other students try to guess the story...

SandraS: "Fifth-grader stranded at movie theater"

SandraS: for instance

SandraS: then writers tell their stories

SandraS: they learn to create suspense

SandraS: on Tuesday, they write the stories

SandraS: after giving the story a headline and telling story

SandraS: so it's a layered writing assignment

SandraS: relying on students' experiences

SharonTr: oh, that sounds so fun and interesting. most students see writing as boring, I

can see this enticing them

SandraS: and a couple genres

SandraS: absolutely, Sharon

SandraS: gets the whole class involved

SharonTr: does everyone write about the same topic?

SandraS: writers have clear audience in front of them

SandraS: the way I understand it, each writer writes about something they experienced

that weekend

SandraS: I haven't read the whole article

SharonTr: oh, so everyone's headline goes on the board?

SandraS: Yes

SharonTr: not just one...

SharonTr: okay

SandraS: like great teaching ideas, this one sounds as if it came out of the teacher's desire to make the Monday morning gabfest stimulate writing

SandraS: so the teacher was already doing something that looked as if it could be revised into something else

MichelleHe: I thought that the persuasive writing for a grade was excellent and could be used across the curriculum

MaureenB: I can see how it can work better now thanks

SandraS: I'm talking off the top of my head, Maureen...now I've gotta go read the whole article...

SandraS: I agree, Michelle

SandraS: a lot of these ideas can be easily adapted

MaureenB: but what you say makes a lot of sense

SandraS: which is why the Summer institute is so great

SharonTr: Michelle, that is good!

SandraS: because you've got teachers from kindergarten through college sharing ideas

MaureenB: I wish I knew about the Summer Institute sooner

SharonTr: wow...how long is the summer institute?

MichelleHe: I am health and PE- We don't always get a great deal of help

SandraS: usually 4 weeks

SharonTr: me too Maureen!

SandraS: we just had a PE person in our summer institute

SandraS: and she really developed some good writing assignments

MaureenB: I had tried to get into Columbia Teacher's College Writer's Workshop class

but didn't get in

MichelleHe: I should get her e-mail from you

SandraS: and it really helped those of us who tend to ignore the physical when we write

Heather Bu: From #16: students working as partners, one is writing a detailed description of a photograph she has been given, the other (not looking at the photo) is writing a list of active verbs, the kind that might provide unexpected energy if they were suddenly dropped into a piece of writing...

SandraS: oh, wow....that sounds great

SharonTr: and then they combine their ideas?

HeatherBu: Right

HeatherBu: Some of the verbs work, some don't

HeatherBu: but the writing grows for both students

SandraS: can you see yourself adapting that in your classroom?

ElizabetAC joined the room.

HeatherBu: Yes, using Flickr and letting them work together.

SharonTr: With my 3rd grade students, I had them each draw a detailed picture of an alien creature, secretly, then they had to use their picture (without showing a partner) to describe what they had on the paper and get their partner to draw the same alien creature. it was all about communicating using details

HeatherBu: I can incorporate all the word processing stuff they need, and yet they are doing some authentic writing

SharonTr: what is flickr?

AndreaDN: Heather, what is Flickr?

SandraS: aha....so excellent example of using technology

SandraS: Flickr is yahoo's photo organizing program

MaureenB: sorry just have to crow a little both of my student teacher got positions in my district for Sept

HeatherBu: http://flickr.com/

MaureenB: just found out

HeatherBu cheers for Maureen's colleagues!

MaureenB thanks Heather

SandraS: yeah!

SusanR: Congratulations!

SandraS: any other thoughts about the 30 ideas?

SusanR: the ideas on visualizing vocabulary can be used across the curriculum and at any grade level ..#4

SusanR: practical ideas you can implement quickly

HeatherBu . o O (many of the photos have a "Creative Commons" license, so you can use the photos as long as you give the proper attribution...FREE)

SandraS: how do you see using them in your classroom, Sue?

SusanR: I am a sub or occasional teacher so I need a grab bag of goodies to use at all times

AndreaDN: I have to get going, but I thank you for letting me join my fist Tapped In discussion. I learned about a few good urls and new idea. Thanks...

SandraS: a big TOOLBOX of teaching ideas, eh, Susan?

SandraS: Thanks, Andrea!

AndreaDN left the room (signed off).

FredK: One reason I chose #11 is that it is like a literacy "Life Experience" exercise where the student tells about a life experience, sometimes with prompting. The tutor writes it down exactly as the student tells it and goes over it with the student to learn ho read his/her won words.

SandraS: yes, Fred...

SandraS: I think one of the challenges with writing

SandraS: is that students don't connect writing with their own lives

HeatherBu: I like that one also, Fred

SharonTr: Yes, agreed Sandra. that's why I liked #29

SandraS: great point, Sharon...the importance of valuing home language

SandraS: will just continue to grow

SharonTr: students experience difficulties in their community with their native language. it inspires them to write about it and learn standard English at the same time

SandraS: We're almost at the end of our time, and I just want to remind folks that WriteTalk is also a place to share your own writing

SharonTr: how so?

SandraS: Well, Jeff was working with Elizabeth on a short story

SandraS: Jeff, do you want to explain?

BjB: Sandy will be presenting a session at the Tapped In Festival on July 19...don't miss it!

JeffC: sure

SandraS: Thanks, BJ!

JeffC: Elizabeth is a friend from another site...

JeffC: She asked me to comment on a short story she wrote...

JeffC: So... I started to... and was talking about it with her *here*...

JeffC: and then all of *you* showed up!

JeffC: me... forgetting that WriteTalk was here today... so... I've uploaded it!

BjB: if everyone joins the group and the story is uploaded...

JeffC: and Elizabeth would love to have others comment on it.

JeffC: I have trackchanges on and inserting comments is possible.

JeffC: it's 4 pages

BjB: then you can look a the story and post a comment to the discussion board

JeffC: so... not a lot to read, and then yes... anyway people would like to do it... I'll start a thread on the Discussion board.

SandraS: exactly, and anyone who has a draft of writing about teaching or any other kind of writing can get comments/feedback

BjB: to join the WriteTalk group...

SandraS listens to BJ

BiB: go to the welcome screen in this room

BiB: scroll down on write talk your way on in...

BiB: to THIS IS THE GROUP ROOM FOR WRITE TALK

BjB: click on the green i next to the group name

BjB: this will take you to the group ID page

BjB: at the top of the screen is JOIN THIS GROUP

BjB: once you've joined, the group is added to your pull down favorite places menu and you can enter this room from any location in Tapped In

BiB: and then download the story and post to the discussion board

BjB . o O (these instructions will be in your transcript if I lost you along the way)

SharonTr: everything was great till that last direction. how do we access the story to download it?

SandraS: It can be hard to get feedback on writing, so this is a great place to do it.

SandraS: Sharon, you go into Files

SandraS: the story is posted there

BjB: Sharon, Files is in the blue menu on the left of the screen above this chat window

SharonTr: where's files?

HeatherBu . o O (short story1.doc)

BjB: Discussion is also in that blue menu

SandraS: If you look at the Room View, you'll see the left-hand menu for the room

SandraS: and you can click on Files

SharonTr: I can't find it, but I don't want to slow everyone else down

BjB: Sharon, click on ROOM VIEW at the top of your screen

SandraS: Not to worry Sharon.

BjB: that will bring you back to the welcome screen

SharonTr: ok, got that

BiB: you should now see the blue menu on the left

SharonTr: oh now I see files!

SharonTr: =)

SharonTr: thank you!

BjB cheers

SandraS applauds

SandraS: OK, that brings us to the end of this evening's WriteTalk

BjB waves goodnight. Thanks, Sandy!

CathleenCW: This was the first discussion I have ever attended, and I must say I have learned so much!

SandraS: huge thanks to all of you for exploring and sharing

HeatherBu: Thanks Sandra!!!

BjB: DON'T FORGET THE FESTIVAL ON JULY 19

SandraS: great, Cathleen

HeatherBu: Looking forward to seeing you on the 19th

SandraS jumps up and down

LisaC: Thanks

BjB: the theme is Sustaining Professional Development Online

SandraS bows to Susan

FredK: Thanks Sandra> hope to see you next Wednesday

SandraS: Take care, everyone!
