MichaelH: Hello, everyone, welcome to tonight's social studies forum...

MichaelH: as we normally do, let's start with introductions....

LauraCo: I am a PUMA student from the University of Houston. **DellaS**: I am a pre-service teacher at the University of Houston

SandraHe: Hello, pre-service teacher from the University of Houston (PUMA)

JillianH: I am a pre-service teacher from the University of Akron.

DebbieRa: I'm a grad student at CLU in Thousand Oaks, CA - I have my pre-lim

secondary social science credential

MichaelH: a lot of Texans tonight... have you seen the new Alamo movie?

AndreaYH: no

AndreaYH: was it good

DellaS: not yet, have not had time for much lately. **LauraCo**: No, but I want to. Heard it was really good.

DebbieRa: Who has time for movies?

SandraHe: no, too much work little time for anything else

LauraCo: I am with you Sandra **MeredithLH** joined the room.

DellaS: Michael have you saw the movie?

MichaelH: no, I haven't yet SusanR joined the room.

SandraHe: I heard they made it as close to history as possible

MeredithLH: Which movie are you talking about?

JillianH: Alamo

MichaelH has actually been to the Alamo, however...

MeredithLH: Is this the social studies forum?

LauraCo: yes

MichaelH: yes, we think so...

SandraHe: haha

MichaelH is still looking for the basement in the Alamo, however

DavidIB joined the room.

DellaS: basement

MichaelH: yep, the basement

MichaelH: when I was in San Antonio two years ago... we visited the Alamo on a

Monday...

MichaelH: the next day...

MichaelH: there were some PETA protestors (female)

MichaelH: who had spray painted themselves with zebra stripes...

MeredithLH: Sorry to be off topic, but do any of you have advice about using things like powerpoint in your classroom?

MichaelH: and they ummm... stripped in front of the Alamo...

MichaelH . o O (day late/dollar short)

LauraCo: interesting

MichaelH: Mereidth, what did you want to know?

DellaS: that's life

DavidIB: is this the Social Studies Forum?

MichaelH: we think so...

DavidIB: that sounds reassuring!

MichaelH: Meredith... what sorts of PP question did you have?

DellaS: I guess that topic is current events at the alamo

DebbieRa: Meredith, I use powerpoints for my 9th grade geography lectures **MichaelH**: hey would you University of Houston people do me a favor?

LauraCo: sure SandraHe: yes

SuzanneG joined the room.

MichaelH: have your instructor come here with you next time...

SandraHe: will pass on the message

LauraCo: okay, why?

MichaelH: he/she needs to know what's going on in the forum and work with me to

make this a worthwhile educational experience for you folks.

DellaS: I'll let her know

AndreaYH: My instructor did not send me!

DavidIB: I am sorry to be a bother at the moment . . .but is there a topic list or agenda

that I could review?

MichaelH: Hi, David, Meredith just asked about Power Point, and I wanted to get an idea about what I could help her with.

DavidIB: oh ok, thanks

MichaelH: do you have any Power Point suggestions, David?

MeredithLH: I was just wondering if you think it is worth the effort

DavidIB: I am more of a fan of web based notes and presentations

MeredithLH: I was considering using it, but am not sure if I should (will it be worth my time)

AndreaHa: At third grade we incorporate our vocabulary terms into powerpoint presentations with pictures what grade do you teach?

DebbieRa: I prefer having a ppt ready to writing on the whiteboard

MichaelH: Meredith, I certainly think it is worth the effort...

JillianH: I have found that once you do it a few times, PowerPoint does not seem like nearly as much effort.

DellaS: You can create a slide show pertaining to the topic that you are going to teach

SandraHe: I have seen powerpoint presentation in different ways used in the classroom.

I have seen them used as a introduction for open house, in lessons for notes, in lessons as introductions

MichaelH: however, I'll go a bit beyond the idea of having PP based notes...

DavidIB: I agree Debbie . . . it saves from repeating the same information from class to class

MichaelH: here's why...

DebbieRa: you can add pictures you find on-line...for geography...that is sites from around the world

MichaelH: first of all, you would have to have a sizable projection instrument, or have your font size at least 72 pt. for kids to actually see and read pp notes

MichaelH: now, there is another angle to this... why not use PP as an instructional tool with students... let THEM do the Power Pointing....

MichaelH: want some examples?

DavidIB: sure DellaS: yes JillianH: please

MichaelH digs in his bag of tricks...

SuzanneG: Please

MichaelH: one second AndreaHa: start listing BJ: while we wait...

BJ: a reminder to click on the ACTIONS menu and then DETACH

BJ: that makes your chat window larger and easier to read

LauraCo: thanks

MichaelH: sorry, BJ, forgot to tell 'em that...

DellaS: I am so glad that we know how to integrate technology into our classrooms

SuzanneG: Thanks **MillieD** joined the room.

MeredithLH: Sure, thanks so much!

MichaelH: ok... the first example I'm going to show you is one from nearly seven years ago now...

MichaelH: here's what I will do...

MichaelH: I'll introduce this, then you can click on the link I'll show to look at the page. **MichaelH**: Next you can actually download some student made projects and get a sense on how students can use PP as a learning tool

MichaelH: one question first...

MichaelH: which is more important... for students to learn PP or to learn social studies?

DavidIB: GREAT POINT! **SuzanneG**: Why not both

MichaelH: Suzanne that's a good question...

MichaelH: however...

DavidIB: I ran into the same issue with my kids and FrontPage 2000

MichaelH: let's remember what we teach...

MichaelH: we teach social studies...

DellaS: both as long as learning takes place.

MichaelH: and in my view, let's let the technology be a learning tool, not an end onto itself

DavidIB: Start small and simple so as not to lose the focus of being a teacher

MichaelH: for example...

SandraHe: I agree

MeredithLH: Thanks for all the great advice.

MichaelH: when I did this, I was teaching government and freshman social studies...

MichaelH: therefore what should my focus have been?

MichaelH: anyone?"

DellaS: some of us are elementary teachers and pp will be a tool that we use.

DebbieRa: government and social studies

MichaelH: absolutely

MichaelH: so...

MichaelH: let me ask you to critique this...

MichaelH: now, remember... don't be too tough on me...

MichaelH: this is from Fall, 1997...

DavidIB: don't worry pal

MichaelH: there's been a lot of water under the bridge, and unfortunately, a lot of gray

on top of my head

DavidIB: we have to start somewhere!

SuzanneG: I'm just learning now

MichaelH: this was a lesson I did in conjunction with a Assignment Discovery series

called "The Modern Presidency"...

MichaelH: take a couple of minutes to look at the page (remember, it's in the transcript),

and then come back here to continue the discussion

MichaelH: just click on the link, and it will open in a new window

MichaelH: remember... don't be gone long

MichaelH: http://www.vcsc.k12.in.us/staff/mhutch/modpres/mainpage.htm

MichaelH checks to see if everyone can see the page...

DavidIB: got it **DellaS**: got it

AndreaHa: mine won't go

SandraHe: got it

MichaelH: Andrea, check to see if it's in a minimized window...

DavidIB: now was this for a class presentation?

DebbieRa: did the students set up the info on the presidents?

MichaelH: David, this was for a class assignment

AndreaHa: ok

DavidIB: or a report?

MichaelH: here's what they did...

MichaelH: I had my seniors do PP, and had my freshmen do web pages... **DellaS**: This is great. I know that the student's learned social studies and pp

MichaelH . o O (they used Netscape Gold... that gives you an idea how long ago this

was

DebbieRa: did they work in groups?

MichaelH: yes

DebbieRa: how did you introduce the assignment?

SandraHe: In one of my technology course we did something like your lesson on

Webquest.

SuzanneG: To a new comer like me this is very impressive

MichaelH: BTW: all the materials I had for this project... everything... is available on the web page and you can use any of it you like

DellaS: The finished product shows that they achieved what you set out for them to accomplish

DebbieRa: how long did it take?

MichaelH: whoops, forgot one thing...

MichaelH: here's the URL with all the project material... rubrics, assignment

information, etc...

MichaelH: http://ti2.sri.com/archive/projects/presidency/

LauraCo: thanks

MichaelH: this page is housed on the Tapped In web site.

DavidIB: If you have them or remember . . . what were your objectives for this lesson **DavidIB**: were you trying to get the kids to have some basic facts about the presidents **MichaelH**: well, David, my freshmen were learning about history... in other words... how

a historian gathers evidence, etc.

MichaelH: yes

DavidIB: so research but not in conventional paper form

MichaelH: we were studying the chapters on the presidency in government class and the Assignment Discovery series was a good help for that

DebbieRa: were there specific areas the students were supposed to research?

MichaelH: what I did was have the kids research a specific president in the series...

DavidIB: as far as the presentation what were your grading criteria?

MichaelH: I added a couple of presidents that weren't on the tv series

MichaelH: David, I've got the rubrics (crude as they are) on the web page for download...

DavidIB: that would be great

MichaelH: you can also see all the requirements I had, etc.

MichaelH: Now, remember, this was VERY basic

DavidIB: seeing the finished product is cool . . . but I am more interested to see the plan and what your mindset was in regard to the lesson

MichaelH: before long, I sort of branched out a bit.

DellaS: what model of lesson plan did you use?

MichaelH: that's all on the TAPPED IN page... you should be able to pretty much recreate the entire assignment from that

MichaelH . o O (pardon how cheesy that page looks)

DebbieRa: Did you find that writing about the President they researched and then using technology for a web page, helped your students have a better understanding of the material?

MichaelH: Debbie, I didn't really evaluate them on that aspect (although I should have)... today I would probably have done more...

MichaelH: however, based on what technology was like in my district at that time, and what the kids did, I was more than pleased.

DebbieRa: so much now about teaching to the standards, I find that writing really helps students grasp the information

SuzanneG: What were the students comments about this lesson do you remember?

DavidIB: so in the seven years since, I am excited to hear how you have grown and how your expectations have changed

MichaelH: I think they liked it... especially when they got feedback from people from some of the presidential libraries, and from the Discovery Channel

DellaS: Did you have a reflection on this lesson

JillianH: Were your students frustrated with the technology? I do tech support for adult distance learning classes UA, and I know they get frustrated because they don't know how to make PowerPoints and they are required to.

MichaelH: that came mainly as e-mail, and was included in some text components, but not online

MichaelH: Jillian, that's a really good question.

MichaelH: I think it went both ways...

MichaelH: one of my favorite stories with this lesson was about a group of girls in one of the government classes.

MichaelH: they couldn't get a "C" on a government test, if they put all three of their scores together...

MichaelH: but, they just took off with this...

JillianH: Debbie, I constantly include writing in my lesson plans that are based on standards (in fact I am working on a set for a class I am in now).

DellaS: Teaching that lesson now what would be your focus?

MichaelH: one day, I went by the lab during our lunch period... and saw them in there...

DavidIB: that is rewarding

MichaelH: I asked them, "what are you guys doing", they told me they were working on their project... I reminded them it was lunch... and they told me they'd rather work on their project than eat.

MichaelH: I figured that was a good endorsement

MichaelH . o O (Dr. Atkins can't even claim that!)

SuzanneG: Hurray for tech

DebbieRa: It just proves that we have to use all sorts of methods to reach our students, since they have different strengths and interests

MichaelH: BTW: their project is in the period 6 government class... they did the pp on JFK

MichaelH: Della asked a really good question.... we need to go back to that....

JillianH: I think that's how I feel when I help one of the students in the classes I cover for DL say, "thanks for showing me how to do it, I got an A"

MichaelH: Della, remember what you asked?

MichaelH: agree 100% Jillian

AndreaHa: That happens sometimes with your ADHD kids -technology will pull them in and they will put themselves really into it

MichaelH: Della asked me if I were teaching the lesson today, what would be my focus...

MichaelH: well....

MichaelH: let's see what I did right (or not right) since then... I'll be the student teacher tonight, and you be the instructor...

MichaelH . o O (maybe I can get on the U of H faculty.....)

SandraHe: As a pre-service teacher that is one thing that our professors and teachers tell us, there are all types of learners and if we understand that it will help us as teachers

MichaelH: Sandra, I bet you are talking about multiple intelligences!

MichaelH: anyway, are you ready to grade me tonight?

DebbieRa: yes DellaS: yes LauraCo: yes

MichaelH: Debbie, you sure answered fast!

DavidIB: sure SandraHe: ok MichaelH: ok... SuzanneG: can't wait

SandraHe: yes, multiple intelligence

DellaS: very important

MichaelH: The day of the TAPPED IN Summer Carnival in 2001, I'm sitting in my

living room watching TV, and see an ad for an upcoming HBO mini-series

MichaelH: called....

MichaelH: Band of Brothers

MichaelH: anyone familiar with it?

SandraHe: yes

LauraCo: I love war shows and movies

MichaelH . o O (it's on History Channel this week)

AndreaHa: I've heard of it

DebbieRa: yes I'm watching it because I'm teaching WWII in World History for 10th

grade

DavidIB: yes

LauraCo: great I wanted to see that

DellaS: yes

MichaelH: I think, "wow, what a great topic for a social studies forum"...

SuzanneG: Haven't

DebbieRa: It's on history channel right now...started on Sunday night **MichaelH**: anyway, I contact my buddies at Cable in the Classroom...

MichaelH: and one thing leads to another, and we get the forum set... anyone want to

take a guess at what date we scheduled it for?

DavidIB: spring break?

MichaelH: nope

MichaelH: I'll give you a hint... it was in the fall

SandraHe: labor day MichaelH: close

DavidIB: right after 9-11

DebbieRa: 9/11 **MichaelH**: yep

MichaelH: 9/12/2001

MichaelH: what made it worse was that at least one of the people who was going to be in the session was flying in to NYC from Boston the day before, and of course, that's where one of the planes left from.

MichaelH: so we had to postpone...

DellaS: and the timing **SandraHe**: oh no

MichaelH: it's still one of the best sessions we ever had though, even though we had it at the end of September instead of the day we were going to...

MichaelH: anyway, teachers, I'm giving you a shot at grading me

MichaelH: here's the most recent BoB project page I have.

MichaelH: http://www.vcsc.k12.in.us/staff/mhutch/bob/

MichaelH: ok, professors... tell me what you like and what you don't...

MichaelH . o O (I'll give you a minute to look at the page and the assorted files)

MichaelH "girds his loins" for the upcoming evaluation....

SandraHe: how long did it take you to set it up

DavidIB: there is no lack of resources

LauraCo: great site

MichaelH: Sandra, in actuality, I first developed this site in 2002, and then updated it for last year

DebbieRa: What level of students were you having do this project? College Prep, standard, etc?

DavidIB: did the kids have any issues when it came to choosing a particular resource to complete the task?

MichaelH: Debbie it was a mixed bag... really heterogeneous

MichaelH: I'm not sure I follow, David...

SandraHe: It is a great series and looks like a great project.

MichaelH: we had a lot of fun...

MichaelH: and learned a lot about WW II

AndreaHa: It looks very interesting

DavidIB: I have found that when you give them a lot of sites and places to search . . . some kids get overwhelmed

DellaS: Grading you on what I have saw as well as what I have read. I will say you were on topic and that you shared some interesting information with us.

SandraHe: I learned quite a bit from the series

DebbieRa: I think it's a great project, but I have a low level, English Language Learner class, it would have to be watered down for them to complete

MichaelH: the kids had a Marine Corps captain e-mail them, asking to use their projects as part of a presentation HE was doing

MichaelH: Would it, Debbie?

MichaelH: I'm not sure. I did this with high school juniors and sophomores

DebbieRa: How long of video segments did you show at a time?

DavidIB: if they didn't complain then it probably was not a problem

MichaelH: I also got an e-mail from a surviving family member of one of the characters in the film.

MichaelH: I let the kids watch an entire episode

SandraHe: very impressive

MichaelH: most were about 70-90 minutes

MichaelH: Again, anything here you can use, well, you know where it is...

SandraHe: Were the parents on board

MichaelH: Actually I heard from the families of TWO of the characters in the film.

SandraHe: I noticed that you had to get permission slips

MichaelH: yes... I had the kids take home a parent form that the parents had to sign...

MichaelH: mainly because of the language in the film

DellaS: What did the family have to say about it?

DebbieRa: the movie was rated R so it is standard to have permission forms

MichaelH: David Kenyon Webster's son e-mailed me... I asked his permission to use his dad's picture on the web page (took it from the son's web site)

DellaS: Did the student's have to write anything after watching the film?

MichaelH: and then the niece of another of the characters e-mailed me... and sent ME a pp presentation she did when she went to the premier of the film at Normandy.

DebbieRa: I sometimes ponder about the balance of showing videos in the classroom, how much they should be used, and if you are keeping on task with what you should be teaching????

MichaelH: She had all sorts of pictures of her, Tom Hanks, Steven Spielberg, and Stephen Ambrose... how cool is that!?

SuzanneG: Wow you had some great input

MichaelH: Debbie, that's a good point, but...

MichaelH: this was for an educational purpose,. we didn't watch the whole series as a class, and therefore I felt it was justified.

MichaelH: One more resource, if you want to see it.

AndreaHa: yes

DellaS: The video should be showed to enhance what the teacher is teaching.

SuzanneG: sure

MichaelH: well, the next year... I was honored to be asked to help write curriculum for a re-airing of one of the most watched PBS series in history...

SandraHe: I like the fact that you were not just showing pieces that you actually let them see it and put it out there

MichaelH: a little film called "The Civil War"

JeffC: what was it about?

MichaelH: Spanish-American war, Jeff

MichaelH . o O (50,000 comedians in the world out of work, and I get Jeff)

JeffC: lol

DebbieRa: so is your curriculum available?

MichaelH: anyway, well, I kept bugging the people at the PBS affiliate that produced this...

MichaelH: "wouldn't be nice... if we could get... on our stage...

MichaelH: "Jeff Cooper"....

MichaelH: whoops, wrong stage...
MichaelH: and we got the other guy....
MichaelH: what was his name, Jeff????

DellaS: Thanks for all of the information that you shared Michael and I really think that you are a well prepared instructor.

JeffC: uh...

MichaelH: oh, some guy named Ken Burns... **MichaelH**: we had him in a forum session

JeffC: oh yeah JillianH: cool

MichaelH: it was a heck of a lot of fun

MichaelH: ummm... one thing...

MichaelH: Ken's not a computer person, so we had to hook him up on the phone, I asked him questions, and we had a typist do his answers

MichaelH: you just can't imagine how much fun it was to pick up the phone, and hear the voice on the other end say, "hi, this is Ken"...

JillianH: I concur with everyone else.

MichaelH: now wait a second... I fear we may be guilty of grade inflation...

JillianH: haha DavidIB: LOL

DellaS: Keep this same effort and share what you have with other like you are now

doing.

MichaelH: there's got to be something that needs adaptation or changing

MichaelH: oh, gotta tell you about the NEXT session

SuzanneG: accept it with grace...you earned it

DebbieRa: I have to give you an "A" but I need more time to research your projects if

you want more feedback

DellaS: experience is the best teacher

MichaelH: well, I have been very lucky too... had a lot of people to support me in what I

tried to do.

DavidIB: I am interested to see how you made your transition

MichaelH: many of them are TI people

DavidIB: may I contact you?

MichaelH: sure...

MichaelH: mhutch@charter.net

DebbieRa: So you're saying if we aren't there yet, like me in my first year of teaching,

not to despair

MichaelH: absolutely, Debbie

MichaelH: don't worry, I know you're doing great already!

SandraHe: for me who is just starting out it is great to see such motivation from teachers who have the experience and still love their job

LauraCo: I agree Sandra

AndreaHa: Thanks Michael I enjoyed the chat

DebbieRa: Very True
